



Anti-social behaviour and crime reporting

So, the main SCRA news is covered by the SNT page 4-7—I urge you to read and prepare yourself and your neighbours with regards to the scams and burglaries taking place. The more we are prepared and look out for each other, the safer we will be.

Byron Court

I wish I could tell you some news about the Byron Court expansion, but it has all gone very quiet—no updates from the Council—the promise of regular updates from them and the construction company fail to materialise. It makes it difficult for us to plan, but we do have things in the pipeline.

Responsible Dog Owners

I am a dog owner and regularly walk my dogs around the estate, and I am saddened by the lack of consideration that some dog owners show to others in our community. Please, fellow dog-owners, could you ensure you pick up after your dogs every time! I understand that sometimes you might run out of 'poo-bags' but that doesn't account for the amount of dog mess in our two lovely parks.

The other thing I'd like to mention is that—for the second time since I've lived on this Estate—one of my dogs was attacked by two other dogs. The trip to the vet aside, my dog is traumatised; and if the first attack is anything to go by, my household will be dealing with this long after the physical scar has disappeared.

Please, if you own big, strong dogs—especially un-neutered males—and especially if you own more than one—learn to recognise the behaviours your dog is demonstrating while out and about. It's not enough to say that 'this has never happened before' after it has attacked—it has probably shown some physical indicators previously, and has now progressed to a bite. Sadly, there's nothing more I can do other than to appeal to you—but just know that, as a dog lover, there's nothing worse than witnessing an attack.

There are also people who don't like dogs, or are maybe scared of them—please don't put them in a position of having to deal with the unwanted attention of your dog, or of it's mess.

I have included a short article if you're considering bringing a new dog/puppy into your family (page 12-13)

All that is left for me to say is 'Happy Christmas'—hope to see you at the Christmas Bazaar on 10th December (see page 31) Oh, and bring along a book for our Book Swap!

BURGLARIES:

There continues to be a spate of burglaries occurring in the Northwick Park area at the time of writing this article. As you will see from the figures and dates towards the end of the article, the burglaries are not occurring every day/evening – they are sporadic but no doubt it does appear that the area is being targeted.

We urge you, as residents, to be vigilant and on the look out for any suspicious behaviour/ suspicious cars - are there persons loitering around, looking into houses, knocking on doors, looking suspicious/shifty??

As Christmas approaches, there tends to be an increase in burglary numbers throughout London - please be ever more vigilant.

Report any suspicious sightings on 101 or anyone who you believe to be in the commission of a burglary on 999.

Please look at the advice on burglary prevention at the end of this article.

Our team is out on the patch patrolling in unmarked cars in an effort to try to catch these burglars; we also held a street briefing for residents at The Green on Nov. 14th to raise awareness.

A number of addresses in Norval Road had SmartWater distributed to them – Smart-Water is a substance that can be put on valuables and if they are stolen and recovered by police can be easily re-united with the owner. Check out the SmartWater website for a better explanation.

DISTRACTION BURGLARY/SCAMS:

This was mentioned in last months Courier but I would like to alert you to this type of crime again:

In late September there was, what the police term a Distraction Burglary on an elderly female resident of Watford Road – males knocked at her door claiming to be from the Gas Board; claiming there was a gas leak and they needed urgent access to her house.

Previously, other Distraction burglars have claimed to be plumbers and claiming that there has been a leak next door.

On other occasions, the ploy used is to say that they are police officers.

The common denominator with these Distraction burglars is that they are generally not known to the occupant and using scare tactics to gain access to your property.

Really scrutinise who is knocking on your door; if you know of an elderly resident please ensure that they have a strong chain lock fitted and urge that they use it.

Be suspicious of any unknown person who calls at your address, especially if you are elderly — DO NOT ALLOW THEM INTO YOUR ADDRESS.

If someone claims to be from British Gas / EDF / Thames Water then contact these companies who will be able to confirm whether or not the caller at your doorstep is genuine.

Residents have asked me to see if there is a telephone number for the individual companies that residents can contact in order to confirm identity. I have been unable to find any one number for each company that can be contacted.

Be prepared. Ask your energy provider for a number you can call should you need to confirm someone's identity. If someone knocks at your door – do not open the door widely, keep it ajar with your foot up to the base, leave the chain lock on. Ask them who they are – their full name, take a note, ask to see their ID, ask what company they work for, if they are there to read your meter then do they have a meter reading device? Close the door, and call the company and try to confirm the identity of the person at your doorstep.

I have also been informed that there are such things as Smart Meters that you can have installed and once you have this installed there will be no reason for a meter reader to attend your address. Your meter can be read remotely once the Smart Meter is installed

If someone is at your doorstep claiming to be a police officer (whether in uniform or plain clothes), then likewise ask them for their name, shoulder number, what police station they are from and warrant number - write this information down. Then ask to see their warrant card - police officers will not normally hand this over for inspection but will show you. All Brent officers have shoulder numbers ending in QK - for constables they tend to be three digit numbers i.e mine is 621QK and for police sergeant one/two digit numbers i.e sergeant Cryan's shoulder number is 31QK. The shoulder numbers will be displayed on their shoulders. Ring 101 if you doubt them in any way, the police operator on 101 should be able to contact the person at your doorstep if they are genuine.

SCAMS:

There are a variety of scams out there please do not fall victim to them, they are very convincing. One woman was defrauded of money following a telephone call claiming to be from the HMRC. Other calls

received by residents are from persons purporting to be from the Ministry of Transport, the Apple store and even the purporting to be from the police. All these calls are designed to use scare tactics in order for you to part with your money or bank details. The persons making these calls are very convincing and will scare you. Sometimes, they will try to keep your landline open so if you receive one such call and are worried about it, then after the call wait at least 10-15 minutes before you use your landline, preferably use your mobile.

Another resident has received a text on his mobile claiming that he had won a lottery or cash, in his instance the name used was FURO-MEGA DRAW.

Please please please do not respond to these calls, or emails or text.

Do NOT disclose any personal details or bank details if you receive any phone calls or any one at your front door.

The Met Police website has a whole list of scams under the heading Advice and then under Fraud Alert.

TRAFFIC/PARKING MATTERS:

Parking - it has come to my attention that a number of residents are "reserving" their car park place, despite having driveways, by putting cones/bins out on the road. Not only are you committing an offence, you could also be sued if someone was to have an accident owing to the presence of these articles on the public highway. I realise that parking spaces are scarce but likewise there are some addresses that there are 5 vehicles to an address – the estate was not built to have this number of vehicles per household

If you put cones/bins out to "reserve" car parking spaces please desist from this activity – you could end up being prosecuted/ sued for it.

Speeding – I continue to see residents speed around the area. The Sudbury Court estate is a 20mph zone – please adhere to this. Speeding is a huge contributor to collisions and resultant injuries. Take it easy, and drive slowly.

LOCAL POLICE, LOCAL KNOWLEDGE

Crime Prevention Advice:

Burglary -

- Ensure that your perimeter fence/wall, vour house doors and windows are fit for purpose. Boundary walls and fencing along with shrubbery is the first line of defence to an intruder and should be good enough to keep a potential burglar out. A lot of houses in the Sudbury Court Estate have a shared driveway with easy access to the rear, if at all please try to get this open access gated off - most burglars gain access via the rear of a house
- Please ensure that garden sheds are locked and that all garden implements are locked away as frequently these are used to break in to houses.
- Consider getting an alarm / alarm box fitted, CCTV cameras or dummy ones.
- Keep your car keys hidden and not on/in the cabinet near your front door.
- Make sure to secure your side gates when you go out and ensure that your garden fence or wall is durable and designed for purpose - to keep out intruders!
- Consider installing an alarm system and a safe for your jewellery and valuables.

Vehicle Crime -

- do not keep goods/valuables in your car; ideally leave your glove box open
- do not leave a sat nav holder on display and rub off all marks of sat navs from your windscreen.
- Be on the look out for tow away vehicles, these are being used to steal cars from people's driveways if you see someone load your neighbours vehicle onto a tow truck/ and your neighbour is not present then you may be witnessing a theft so consider ringing the police try to obtain the registration number of the tow truck.

Robbery -

- Stay alert! try be aware of your surroundings when you are out and about, this is especially important if you listening to an iPod or on a mobile phone.
- Stay clear! if you think you are being followed or that someone looks like their up to no good, then cross the road or go into a shop/address ring the police if necessary.

Bicycle Thefts -

- Ensure that you secure your bicycle with a substantial lock at all times and leave in a well lit place.
- obtain your frame number and register your bicycle on www.BikeRegister.com - this could assist police in recovering your bicycle if stolen.

It's the most wonderful time of the year, but it is also the time to be incredibly vigilant. We have now entered the holiday season where houses are vulnerable to criminal activity. So please check that your houses are both safe and secured, especially if you are going away for the holidays.

In the recent months, we have had a few burglaries on the Sudbury Court Estate. One of the ways these criminals have been entering homes is by pretending to check your gas meters and then once the door is open they will barge their way in. So please ask for identification when someone is knocking on the door. It is the most wonderful time of the year and it would be an incredible shame if it was ruined because of criminal activity.

To ensure our residents' safety, Brent Council will be increasing its number of police. This is important for us: we believe that as residents your safety is paramount. The cabinet member Cllr Tom Miller, Brent Council's Cabinet Member for Stronger Communities, said:

Are you worried about your memory? PART II

Last month I started to write about memory loss and the difference between normal ageing and dementia. Have you forgotten the name of your second cousin (he hasn't spoken to you for several months), or the place you went last year on holiday? What is the name of that special spice your granny used to use, and what is another word for forgetful?

You could be sitting doing a crossword puzzle asking these questions without worrying about having memory loss and just because you can't bring the word quickly to mind does not mean that you have advancing dementia. The word will come back if you allow it to of its own accord and if you reinforce it by saying it a few times it will stay with you even longer: if you don't use it, you lose it. The word is stored further back in your memory banks and needs a little bit of digging to pull it out. Someone with

dementia will forget that word again very quickly, no matter how many times it is reinforced and as dementia worsens, more commonly used words and even the names of people seen every day are forgotten, misused or garbled. We have all told the same story twice but usually remember a little way through. Someone with dementia does not recognise that they have told that story and if challenged will deny it. They may well start to tell you the exact same story again in a few minutes, usually using the same words, phrases and expressions.

Patients are frightened of asking their doctors about whether they might have dementia. They are alarmed when they find they cannot remember words, names or they have misplaced things. One lady was extremely concerned when she returned home from a triumphant trip to Marks and Spencer with a lovely new pair of yellow shoes, only

Understandably she was horrified and very worried. This is indeed an episode which is concerning, but in as much as she had complete recall, it is an example of forgetfulness. Someone with dementia would have no recollection of having bought those shoes and might deny that they had ever done so, they

will tell you that their memory is fine and cannot think of situations where memory loss caused problems. Next time we will ask you some questions which will help to clarify what is normal ageing memory loss and what is more likely to be the progressive brain disease we call dementia.

Not Just for Christmas











The cute puppy - big eyes, sloppy tongue, playing, sleeping, a loyal family member - that's the dream. As your puppy grows - which they do ridiculously quickly, those things that you thought were so adorable can become annoying, and worse; new habits forming and constant demands for attention, food and exercise. Avoid these common new dog owner mistakes and you will have a new member of the family that is a joy to be around.

Top 10 mistakes new dog owners make

- 1. "He's so cute!". All pups are cute, but is it the right fit for you and your family? All dog breeds have different personality traits and exercise needs. If you're busy, out at work a lot and don't have time for long walks/runs, don't choose a Husky massive cute factor, but is genetically built for running miles a day. Research the breed you're thinking of, be honest! and you'll be on the right road even before you bring your puppy home.
- 2. "What you see is what you get." Often people pick out a puppy, assuming the personality they see right there is the dog they will have for life. However, like children, puppies go through anxieties, hormone changes, and environmental experiences that will determine their personality as an adult. Once he settles in to your home and gets comfortable, be prepared to see his true colours.
- **3. No House Rules.** Often a puppy is brought home, off comes the lead and it's set "free. He's allowed to do something for a

few weeks/months, because he's cute and 'just playing' and then we change the rules and decide we don't want him to do it anymore. Before you bring a new dog or puppy into the house, sit down with members of the household and decide what the dog will and will not be allowed to do. Choose where the dog will sleep, if it's allowed on the furniture, when it will be fed, walked, etc. Setting the rules is a big key to success.

- **4. Inconsistency.** Once your rules are set FOLLOW THEM! This means everyone! Of course family members, but also friends and anyone who has regular contact. Dogs are smart, and if just one person allows them certain behaviours, e.g. jumping up, or chewing fingers, then they will continue that behaviour much to the annoyance of everyone else. Hold the humans accountable and your dog will learn very quickly.
- **5.** "Baby" is Too Young to Train. By the time you get your puppy, at 8 weeks, they are fully capable of learning and should be introduced to simple commands from the moment they set foot in your house. Positive reinforcement training strengthens your bond with your dog, sets it up within the hierarchy of your household, and leads to a well behaved dog.
- 6. **She'll Grow out of It.** Generally speaking, dogs do not grow out of bad behaviours, in fact, left to their own devices they will get worse. Remember, these behaviours are only considered bad by us your dog is self-rewarded by digging up the flowers, chasing the cat, and bullying other dogs in the park.

He's not going to stop unless you give him a reason to, through reinforcement.

- 7. Getting Away with it. New dog owners think their tiny puppy trying to jump on them for attention is adorable, and that little howl she makes when she is left alone is just too sad to ignore. However, when your 30kg Shar Pei jumps up on your 90 year-old grandma, it won't be so cute. And your sympathy will stop when your adult Husky howls all night while you try to sleep. Keep in mind how big your dog will be and whether or not you want those behaviours to continue as an adult dog. If not, stop them now.
- 8. No Socialisation. New dog owners often assume that dogs are just friendly by nature. Puppies have a socialisation window that ends around 12-16 weeks. During this time, the more experiences your dog has with other (positive) dogs (small, large, short hair, long hair) and people (old, young, with hats, beards, in wheelchairs, etc) the more friendly and calm your dog is likely to become.
- 9. No Management. Your new family member does not know the difference between a squeaky toy and a Prada bag, nor can he learn without help, and learning takes time. Manage your new dog by not leaving things out for him to chew, keeping watch on him while he is loose, and confining him in a safe place when you're not there. If you leave

your new shoes and your puppy alone, the end result is your fault, not the dog's.

10. Not Recognising Fear/Anxiety/
Dominance. New owners might say that their dog won't walk with them outside, doesn't want to greet other dogs, or won't respond to commands in public places. In a lot of cases, the puppies or dogs are not being "stubborn" (a human trait we give to dogs), but are actually anxious or fearful of the situation they have been put in. Not being able to recognise when your dog is fearful is a big mistake that can be costly.

Not recognising when your dog shows signs of dominance is also a big mistake. All dogs show physical signs of how they feel – learn what they are.

Seek out a professional trainer (one who properly understands dog behaviours) to help you learn how to manage your dog in these situations, for the wellbeing of your dog and you.

- * Research, pick your dog breed carefully,
- * Develop a plan,
- * Follow through with rules consistently,
- * Manage until she has learned the rules,
- * Socialise her.



Sudbury Court Resident Going For Tokyo Gold



Nathan Fox is a Great Britain international triple jumper living on Oldborough Road in the Sudbury Court Estate. Earlier this year he won his second consecutive British Indoor Championship and was only centimetres away from a Rio Olympic appearance.

Nathan is one of Great Britain's most prestigious triple jump talents. After breaking the UK under 15 national record at 14, he became the first and only person of that age in British history to jump over 14meters (14.11m). He then represented Great Britain for the first time at the European Youth Olympics, placing 5th in the final. After being plagued with two serious injuries which hindered his natural progress, Nathan represented England at the 2014 Commonwealth Games where he placed 6th in the Final. Nathan regards former Commonwealth Games triple jump champion, Larry Achike, as one of his biggest inspirations and someone who has helped him to date.

Nathan's goal is to qualify for the Tokyo Olympics in 2020 and he is already in training to achieve this target.

But I haven't seen it in our garden since!

In fact, the situation may not have been too bad for him. The ground, under deep snow, is usually quite well insulated from the cold and is often fairly soft. Soft enough for the woodpecker to drive its beak into the ground and probe for ants with its amazingly long and sticky tongue. Not ideal conditions, perhaps, but I doubt if it went hungry despite the snow.

Regular wren

In all the years I have been watching the birds in our garden, wrens have been a rarity. They are, in fact, a common bird, but not in our garden. But just recently we have had a regular wren visiting us. It comes every two or three days to forage on our patio. (If you can call our grass-filled and weedinfested crazy paving a 'patio'!)

Each time it appears, just for a moment I think that it's a mouse, but then realize it's our little fellow back again to forage for its breakfast of insects and grass seeds.

Local Residents



Our resident Batman

Keith Barker has lived on the Estate for around 40 years, and is now a member of the Executive Committee of the SCRA.

"Nearly 37 years ago I became interested in UK Bats and their fascinating lives. I studied and obtained Natural England Licences to enable me to carry out bat conservation work and study them scientifically. I always have a few injured bats under long term care at my home.

Bats have been around in their present form for about 50 million years. So they were evolving while dinosaurs were still roaming the Earth. During that long time they have evolved into about 1,400 species, which live all over the World (except for Polar Regions) and eat a wide variety of foods.

All Bat Species, their roosts, hibernation sites, entry and exit points are legally protected in the UK under UK and EU Legislation. It is an offence to take, disturb, deliberately harm or kill bats, to destroy their roosts or hibernation sites without having a licence to do so. The reasons for this high level of protection is because British Bats have suffered a huge decline in numbers since the 1950's, (approx 70%) due to factors such as loss of feeding areas as towns expand into the countryside; changes in agriculture such as removal of trees and hedges, and increased use of insecticides and other agrochemicals; loss of roosting places which, in turn has caused population fragmentation

and further losses.

TV nature programmes often show the large fruit bats that hang in trees in Australia. Thailand, Indonesia etc. but few people realise how tiny our native bats are, or that they eat only insects. We have 17 species of bats in Britain, ranging in size from the Noctule and Greater Horseshoe Bats, which are about 75mm (3 inches) long and weigh about 30g (1ounce), to the smallest (and commonest) Pipistrelle Bats, which are about 40mm (1½ inches) long and weigh only about 6g (1/4 ounce). That's the weight of a sheet of A4 paper! In the Counties of Hertfordshire / Middlesex we have recorded 12 out of the total of 17 resident species. Seven of these are fairly common but localised: biased towards Hertfordshire.



Bats are small mammals. The life of a small mammal is typically counted in months or probably a year and they reproduce very quickly, having large litters regularly to

counter their short lifespan. In total contrast, Bats are long lived; the Pipistrelle bats are recorded living up to 20 years and the larger UK bats up to 30 years. However, the vast majority don't reach this length of life due to predation, disturbance, or other factors. Females only produce a single baby each year, but occasionally twins do occur. Baby bats are very large when born, compared to their adult mothers; they are about 25% to 33% the weight of the adult female. Bats are one of Nature's ways of controlling insect populations and therefore a vital component



This is just a very small introduction to the fascinating world of UK bats. If there is an interest from residents, please let the Courier Editor know and I will submit occasional articles for publication to expand on the many aspects of bats and their ecology. By the time you read this it will be well into the winter hibernation period for our bats but in the spring I can organise a bat walk using electronic bat detectors if there is an interest. This will enable attendees to observe bats in flight and to listen to the ultrasound echolocation calls made by bats as they fly, communicate with each other, and feed on their insect food.




