An excellent example of the alerts in happening has been today (09/02/18), I sent an email alert about a tipper involved in an attempted theft from a van on Byron Road on the 2/2/18 – I didn't have the registration. Today I was sent an email of the tipper with it's registration number. Now, I can do something about this criminal.

We urge you, as a New Year's resolution, to read our articles and try to heed the advice that we give, as we believe it is in your best interests in order to reduce your chances of being a victim of crime.

What have we been up to in the past month?

- I am still investigating a series of thefts from cars in the Sudbury Court Estate area, there are several victims involved and a large quantity of property seized.
- Last month I arrested a male sat behind the wheel of his car in Northwick Park, he was smoking a cannabis spliff and in possession of cannabis. He has now been charged with being in charge of a car whilst being over the specified limit for cannabis and possession of the drug. Drink/drug drivers pose a risk to the public; police will make every effort to arrest such drivers and take them off the road.
- Your team makes efforts to deal with speeding motorists as speed kills. We work with our safer transport /traffic officers employing the use of the speed gun to apprehend speeding motorists. Sometimes, despite the speed limit, the motorists' speed

might be inappropriate and dangerous for the road conditions.

• Your team does a variety of shifts to prevent, deter and detect a variety of crimes and anti-social behaviour. On the 26/1/2018, whilst your team was conducting some shifts into the early hours of the morning, two males were arrested in separate stops on the patch: — Two drunk males were loitering around Northwick Park train station, one of them was arrested as he was wanted for some time for questioning in relation to a criminal damage offence, he had evaded capture during previous attempts to arrest him.

In another incident, your team was on patrol in Aspen Drive when a rental car drove into the estate at a fast speed, on seeing police the car was driven to the dead end in the estate and the occupants decamped the vehicle. Found in the car was a quantity of drugs, a male was subsequently arrested and processed in relation to the drugs found. Your team is liaising with this male's registered landlord (Brent Housing Partnership).

- In another incident, a large amount of drugs was found in an unattended car in the area, this is now being investigated and a person interviewed under caution for possession with intent to supply drugs. Every effort will be made to bring drug dealers to justice.
- We welcome your information on abandoned / suspicious vehicles we do look into them. One resident reported an abandoned vehicle on Oldborough Road that turned out to be stolen.
- Your team continues to conduct patrols in and around Northwick Park and the university, we have received reports of a male in his late teens / 20s approaching women,

stating that he is autistic but grabbing the women and trying to pull them towards the bench. A description will not be given, as I would like to consider the behaviour and not focus on the description. If you do witness this behaviour please ring police, as several women have been approached and we need to know who this person is so that we can ensure that he doesn't do it again.

• Residents please, please, please, do not engage with cold callers. Be cautious, even of people you see doing the driveways of other addresses. In the past couple of days I stopped a male in the Sudbury Court Estate who has a registered company paving firm, he had a Serious Crime Prevention order issued by the Crown Court to him in relation to human slavery offences and offences in relation to his driveway/paving business practices.

• CONTRACTING BUILDERS:

Before you contract any builder, check their credentials thoroughly: ask for their full name, if they are a limited company, check with Companies House and any other federations that they say they are a member of. Also, speak to other residents who have had work done by the builder, what sort of labour they are using (alarm bells should ring if you have a different face at the site every day or children on site, insurance would not cover children on a building site even if they are members of the contractors family), how clean do they maintain the building site and how do they dispose of the waste from your site are your problems and should be your considerations. You are responsible. Most builders worth their salt will have a long waitina list.

• <u>Litter and fly tipping</u>: There is a persistent problem of litter and fly tipping, particularly in Peel Road and Byron Road. Peel Road has improved recently, but we want to keep it clean. Residents and landlords are approached by us if their properties are dirty or a health hazard.

I have and will prosecute people involved in making the area look dirty!

If you have waste/unwanted furniture/an item that you want to recycle then bring it to the charity shop or leave it within your house boundary (behind your wall or behind your gate with a note 'please take' on it).

Report any fly tipping to the council - go onto their website; there is also a handy mobile phone App that you can download to facilitate the reporting of various matters, including fly tipping.

The council offers a number of bulky item waste collections every year - please contact Brent Council street care department for more info on 0208 937 5050.

Crime Prevention Advice:

Burglary -

• Ensure that your perimeter fence/wall, your house doors and windows are fit for purpose. Boundary walls and fencing along with shrubbery is the first line of defence to an intruder and should be good enough to keep a potential burglar out. A lot of houses in the Sudbury Court Estate have a shared driveway with easy

access to the rear, if at all please try to get this open access gated off - most burglars gain access via the rear of a house.

- Please ensure that garden sheds are locked and that all garden implements are locked away as frequently these are used to break in to houses.
- Consider getting an alarm / alarm box fitted, CCTV cameras or dummy ones.
- Keep your car keys hidden and <u>not</u> on/in the cabinet near your front door.
- Make sure to secure your side gates when you go out and ensure that your garden fence or wall is durable and designed for purpose - to keep out intruders!



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Vehicle Crime -

- do not keep valuables in your car; ideally leave your glove box open and do not leave any goods/property in the car.
- do not leave a sat nav holder on display and rub off all marks of sat navs from your windscreen.
- Be on the look out for tow away vehicles, these are being used to steal cars from people's driveways if you see someone load your neighbours vehicle onto a tow truck/a truck with a hoist and your neighbour is not present then you may be witnessing a theft of your neighbour's car so consider ringing the police try to obtain the registration number of the tow truck.

Robbery -

- Stay alert! try to be aware of your surroundings when you are out and about, this is especially important if you listening to an iPod or on a mobile phone.
- Stay clear! if you think you are being followed or that someone looks like they're up to no good, then cross the road or go into a shop/address ring the police if necessary.

Please consult the websites listed for more crime prevention tips or if you do not have access to the internet perhaps speak to us and we might be able to arrange that you obtain a crime prevention pamphlet.

Bicycle Thefts -

- Ensure that you secure your bicycle with a substantial lock at all times and leave it in a well lit place.
- obtain your frame number and register your bicycle on www.BikeRegister.com this could assist police in recovering your bicycle if stolen.

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Councillor's Comments

It is now almost 4 years since I was elected as one of

your three Ward Councillors along with Margaret and Joshua (May 2014). The next Council Election will be held on the first Thursday in May to decide who will represent you for the next 4 years. So this could be the last time I write in the Courier as an elected representative. Margaret and I have been reselected to stand; Joshua decided that he'd rather stand in Harlesden Ward, and has been selected to do so. Robert Johnson, who lives in the SCRA area (Peel Road), has been selected to join us as the third prospective Candidate to represent Northwick Park Ward.

It has been a very eventful & fulfilling 4 years starting with the charges for Green Bins to save the Council money. It was quite a difficult pill to swallow but millions of pounds have been saved by not collecting thousands of empty bins across the Borough. Our own area has seen a reduction in collections of around 2,500 green bins. Obviously there have been other contentious issues,

such as the persistent Fly Tipping.

Some of the hot spots such as the Fairway, South Kenton Station, East Lane and Northwick Park Pavilions were resolved simply by removing the litter bins and recycling receptacles: an easy solution but not at first the obvious one, and met some initial resistance.

I don't know the exact reason why we have so much fly tipping. Perhaps it comes from a change of people's attitude, houses of multiple occupancy (HMOs) - some of our three bedroom properties now have over twelve rooms rented out separately! Maybe some of the paving 'businesses' that constantly tout for business in our streets by door knocking and often provide appalling service and experiences? I'm sure the privet hedges I found in the works compound on Pasture Road were the ones removed from front gardens on Carlton Avenue only the day before; unfortunately I couldn't prove it.

Fly Tipping remains an enormous challenge to us all; it needs reporting and dealing with, where possible by prosecuting those responsible. One particular source of rubbish that really annoys is that which, presumably, is

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dumped out of car windows between 8pm and 6am, normally on blind corners (with no house overlooking the area). You might be aware or guess that the main items dumped are: alcohol bottles and tins, cigarette detritus, fast food wrappings etc, etc. It bemuses me because these items are not purchased locally; they are brought into our unmonitored roads, presumably so the culprits cannot be seen and recognised? What are they hiding from? Besides littering, why are they hiding? Fortunately, the Council now has at its disposal a device which can be used to counter these crimes: the devices are known as Twitters (apparently because birds often set them off when they land on them). Basically, they are battery operated motion detecting cameras that can be located on posts near "hot spots" and used to collect evidence. Hopefully, these devices will be deployed in our area in the very near future, and the culprits dealt with appropriately (at last).

What have I been most pleased about? Obviously, the 100 plus trees around the Ward especially the elms on Elms Lane and the cherry trees on Sudbury Court Drive, to name but two groups of trees. Then the yellow lines installed in dangerous locations, such as around the junction of Sudbury Court Road and Drive. We have asked Harrow Council to install yellow lines on their adjacent highway, especially near St George's Place, sadly to no avail - as yet.

Good news though! I have been working since being elected to have LED street-lighting installed, as it uses 90% less electricity. Finally they are being installed locally. I'm not enamoured by their very harsh blue light, I would have preferred a warmer tone but I'm told a warmer tone would cost more

to purchase & run; therefore, due to the Draconian cuts by Central Government since 2010, we've purchased the cheaper option.

Bad News: The severe CUTS to the Council grant received from Central Government is now circa twice the amount that the Council collect in Council Tax. I believe these are unnecessary and deflationary CUTS that are totally unnecessary and have brought the Economy to its knees unless you are a property developer or similar. These CUTS are the reason that our Council Tax will be raised again this year- and this time by a massive 5.01%! The Government itself acknowledges - and here I quote from the Council's Cabinet Report: "Taking into account the inflationary pressures that the Council is subject to (which Ministers have confirmed were a significant factor in their decision to increase the referendum limit)" This is a Central Government contrived tax increase by our current Government via the backdoor.

It is with great disappointment - and shows up our disjointed government nationally that I have to report that Wembley is to have yet another Primary School (three Form Entry 6-700 pupils), even though reports show - and we reported to the Planners that there is a falling need for, and take up of Primary school places in Brent. We all know about the Primary School place "emergency" that resulted in the massive and extremely contentious and disruptive Byron Court School Expansion. Well, Central Government have decided (without any reference to Brent Council) to fund an Ark Academy Primary School on Wembley Hill Road in the York House car park near the Hilton Hotel yes, on a highly polluted road in Central Wembley Park!!

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Harrow School Sports Centre and Science Block Planning Application or an Inappropriate (depending on who you are) Building on 'Protected' Metropolitan Open Land on the South side of Harrow Hill. Episode II - The Mayor's Decision!

At the end of January 2018, Harrow School received a blow at the hands of the Planners when London Mayor, Sadiq Khan, rejected plans for a new 7,300 sq m sports facility which would have been built on 4,600 sq m of Metropolitan Open Land (MOL). The Mayor made it clear that he supports the expansion of Harrow School's sporting facilities and would welcome greater access offered to the local community - but that it should not come at the expense of protecting open, green spaces such as MOL, particularly when alternatives are available.



The Mayor's Refusal Notice states: "The proposed sport building is inappropriate development within MOL & causes substantial harm to the openness - by reason of its excessive footprint & location. The harm to MOL by reason of the proposed inappropriate development, & harm to openness, to which substantial weight is attached, is not clearly outweighed by other considerations. Very special circumstances do not exist. The proposed sports building is contrary to London Plan Policy. I would, nevertheless, be minded to withdraw this direction if the applicant were to submit revisions to the application that would propose a new sports building (of a significantly reduced footprint to that currently proposed) on the site of the existing sports hall. I strongly encourage the applicant to engage with GLA Planning, Harrow Council & other relevant stakeholders in order to pursue this."

Interestingly, this is exactly what the Harrow Hill Trust and many local residents have been asking for all along. While this has been going on, Harrow Council has granted the School planning consent to extend and "enhance" the green keepers' hut within Capability Brown's Harrow Park boundaries (the end of the lake). It is of concern that this building will be lit at night and will no doubt affect and endanger the large bat populace which uses the lake and surrounding area to forage. This begs the question: have the current buildings been searched for bat roosts?

One Public Estate - or - Building on Publicly Owned Land at the rear of Northwick Park Hospital and Westminster University - It is many things but present plans don't show building on the Playing Fields

I. and fellow local campaigners, have been monitoring the proposals under the Government's One Public Estate (OPE) programme for some years and have reported our observations in this magazine. After a very quiet 12 months (other than the publication of the Memorandum of Understanding (MoU) at the beginning of last year), there has finally been movement. Brent Cabinet received a Feasibility Study for the future of the combined Northwick Park site and discussed a report at their February Meeting. I believe that this new position is as startling as the previous proposals used in the bid documents for public funding to pursue the objectives of OPE. (NB a 2nd bid for funding has been agreed). It should be noted that Central Government has adopted the Naylor Report on NHS real-estate, which has similar objectives of realising capital receipts for NHS land sales, especially in the capital.

So, what is my position, and what do I believe to be that of my fellow prospective Candidates? Well, along with most of the local people with whom I have discussed OPE over the last year or so, we believe it is now time to redevelop the outdated format of the housing at the rear of the Hospital (Network Homes Housing Association) to provide a more appropriate and denser housing offer for Hospital staff and key workers in the locale. We also believe that any new properties should therefore be rented out at a truly affordable or social rent, and not the 'Affordable Rent' oft referred to in Planning Applications - which is actually 80% of the private rental rate (or as much as can be got for it). We three really want to see truly affordable rents in this location; without this, our Hospital will not be able to

attract, recruit and retain the staff which are essential for the Hospital to continue to function properly, perhaps reducing the reliance on agency staffing and saving the Hospital large amounts of money which could be used to fund improved care.

It is clear that, to provide this key worker housing, capital will have to be found; the norm is to sell off land to developers, who will no doubt build properties for sale and rent. Obviously, they will want the most desirable land by the Tube Station and those with views over the nearby playing fields of Brent and Harrow. I personally will resist any high rise developments, as I believe my fellow prospective Candidates will.

So, what is in these reports and what are the current recommendations? The full versions can be found on the Brent Council Website under Cabinet Agendas and Minutes for the February 12th Meeting. If you have problems locating these, ring or email and I'll assist.

The report begins: This is an exciting, ambitious project where Brent leads a consortium of public sector landowning partners. dissolving ownership boundaries and working collaboratively to deliver a residential led regeneration of the area. There is a collective vision amongst partners to make Northwick Park a landmark destination of choice. delivering a modernised university hospital, central hubs serving local people, improved infrastructure and transport connections, a common energy strategy, shared services and facilities, and reduced running costs. Key objectives for Brent are; more good quality affordable homes. more school places, growth, increased revenue from homes & businesses & generation of growth



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Obviously, there are contentious phrases within the report but, to be fair, the report was written by Brent Officers in conjunction with the other OPE partners, and is guided by Government Policy as above. The Cabinet Paper Recommendation is to approve a variation to the MoU.

The report goes on (very abridged of necessity): Brent received grant funding from the One Public Estate Office (OPE), to lead a consortium of land owning public sector partners in examining the potential regeneration of adjacent landholdings at Northwick Park. The other partners are London North West University Hospital (LNWUH), The University of Westminster and Network Homes Ltd.

The partners have dissolved boundaries of individual ownership and worked collaboratively to produce proposals with a far greater vision than could be achieved individually. Supported by development and planning consultants, GVA, the partners have prepared a feasibility/capacity study, which outlines the next steps required for the project.

Preparation of a supplemental planning brief and a joint master plan for the site, will allow individual or joint development of the site by partners. Whilst two concept plans have been modelled to illustrate potential development scenarios, it is acknowledged more detailed design, due diligence work and stakeholder consultation is required.

Brent has received £470,500 to spend on the OPE Project. This will be used to fund consultants to move the project forward.

So, what area are we talking about? This is defined within the Feasibility Study (the current recommendations). I will do my best to summarise, extracting information directly from the study; the MoU also contains pertinent data, e.g., spending from the OPE grant - see the previous chart.

"GVA were appointed in April 2017 to provide development, valuation and planning advice. to determine potential options for the development and delivery of a comprehensive scheme/master plan at Northwick Park. GVA has been supported by PRP Architects ('PRP') and Peter Brett Associates ('PBA') in understanding technical design and transport constraints at the site and defining capacity for redevelopment. The site comprises a number of different uses: 1) Northwick Park Hospital: 2) Playgolf 9-hole golf course and driving range (incorporating baseball batting cages, fitness suite, golf shop and restaurant; sports pitches, public park and pavilion; University of Westminster; and Ducker Pond, the site of a former swimming pool (overgrown). The locations and extents of these uses is demonstrated in the plan on the next page."

Figure 1: Land Usage and Ownership Plan



All the Council freehold ownership, & Ducker Pond, is designated as Metropolitan Open Land ('MOL') & as can be seen from the Harrow comments, the Mayor may rule against development on MOL as "inappropriate". However, the GVA Feasibility states: There is site specific local policy for the Trust land & Ducker Pond in combination. This supports redevelopment of the hospital for new hospital space, plus ancillary retail & leisure uses, & enabling residential development on land deemed surplus to the hospital.


I am surprised at the statement in the GVA study, as The John Lyon Trust hold Covenants from 1937 over all these lands defining specific uses; these Covenants are at odds to the the study's statement! They did get some facts right: Vehicular access to the site is from Watford Road which is already congested with traffic moving between the Harrow and Wembley areas, and visiting Northwick Park Hospital. New development at the site is only likely to increase pressure on this route. The solution seems to be creating a 2nd access point! Stating the obvious?

What do they want to build?

Student (bed spaces) **1,381**; NHS Flats **580**; private rental **221**; shared ownership **273**; affordable rent (80% full market rent)

You can see (with a magnifying glass) that the blocks towards the outside, near the Tube and park are mainly between 7-9 storeys, & built over car parks. There's even an 11 storey block by the Tube station (the most valuable flats obviously). I'm not sure what's in it for us, are you?

There is so much more information in the published documents—do check them.

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On the verges

An email received from a local resident in reference to Cllr Perrin's comments in the December issue, regarding "Parking on Pavements".

"I have, in the past, sent records and photographs to Brent Council showing the severe damage to grass verges and pavements caused by indiscriminate lorries and van drivers down Abbotts Drive. To date nothing has been done about it. There are many broken and loose pavements, some sticking up as high as 50 centimetres.

A little before Christmas, one elderly lady tripped on one of these raised pavements, fell and broke both her wrists leaving her incapacitated. I believe the council has now repaired that particular pavement.

On 9th January I caught a John Lewis delivery van parked opposite my house with all its wheels parked on

the pavement and grass verge: I reported it to John Lewis, together with photographs.

I have sent this through to Cllr Perrin in the hope that, with this evidence, some pressure

can be applied on the council to take forceful action.



In the hope that the council successfully acts, this will give me and other residents some leverage when approaching drivers that violate our street environment. In the case of the John Lewis driver, he insisted that he had no other choice and would not accept that he was breaking the law, causing dam-

age or obstruction. If, as a resident, I could show evidence that such street violation can

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RSPB Birdwatch

As I mentioned last month, the annual RSPB Big Garden Birdwatch took place during the last weekend of January, when we hope to see and count many bird species.

I have just been reading an article in the subsequent weekend's paper by an expert

bird watcher nature and man. He was bemoaning the paucity of birds to count during chosen hour of RSPB watching. Only a few of his regular birds were there in much smaller numbers than usually he



sees. And his special birds didn't turn up at all!

Not until the hour was up, whereupon all his birds came back again In force! He didn't say it, but what he meant was, "Bah!"

Very often that has been our experience when doing the RSPB count ourselves. But this year was a much better reflection of our normal daily sightings, each of us who undertook the count seeing about 13 or 14 species, which is really quite good. And, between us, our total count was 22 species put together.

The RSPB will announce the results of their Birdwatch at the end of March. I fear that we shall hear again of further decline in many species of garden birds - except feral pigeons!

As always, it was good fun and the chosen hour passed all too quickly. It is a relaxing time just watching the birds, very therapeutic. I commend birdwatching to you. You won't regret doing it.

Recent sightings

Comparing notes with a fellow birdwatcher the other day, I learned that she had watched a grey wagtail bathing in the rain puddles on her flat roof a week or two previously.

The grey wagtail is a rare sighting on the estate. As a species it prefers the terrain of

the babbling brook or a shallow stream flowthrough woodlands seldom ventures far from water but. on occaafter sions heavy rain, it will sometimes grace the puddles of car parks or flat roofs.

chose the

word 'grace' in the last sentence deliberately, because it is a beautiful bird, full of subtle colours belying its name, (as you can see from the photo) and it holds itself so smartly. It is the sort of bird that could start one off as a birdwatcher! Or, if you are already a birdwatcher, it confirms that you are hooked!

We don't usually mention sightings outside the estate, but Grace saw a little egret in a rubbish filled brook which she thinks is the beginning of the Pinn River near North Harrow. Granted that the little egret is expanding its range year by year, this was still a most exciting find. After all, North Harrow or Pinner is just a few wing beats to here so, if you are walking in the fields along Pryors Path, you might see it.

Who knows? That's the fun of birdwatching!

And do let me know what birds you see around the estate. The more we can share, the more fun it is.

March is the month that your local horticultural society stirs into life for another gardening year, with our Spring Show on **Saturday 10th March**. We hope you will join us in

welcomina the Spring. This show features all the earlyflowering plants, but specially celebrates the many varieties of daffodils and other bulbs as well as pot plants that you may well have kept all winter

We are so lucky to have gardens around our homes, and this

year we want to specially encourage our multi-cultural community to share in gardening traditions

Maybe you too have enjoyed Monty Don's recent television series on Paradise Gardens, where he travelled to Iran, India and beyond to show how the making of a garden, divided into four parts by hedges, flower beds and water channels has been adapted to suit all cultures. Among the most cherished blooms in the paradise garden was the rose, in all its variety - a plant that flourishes so well in our London clay soil.

Our homes were first built in the 1920s and 1930s when many young families sought to escape the smoky air of London to live in the suburbs where every house had a garden with space for children to run and play and for families to grow flowers, as well as fruit and vegetables for a healthy diet. It was in this happy environment that many of us in SCHS learned our gardening skills. Some of us are keen to bring these pleasures to the young people who live in Sudbury Court today. workshops with various gardening and craft activities for young people of school age, who must be accompanied by a parent or responsible adult to comply with the law.

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

We have been invited to assist with seeding and planting of bulbs etc in these designated

areas. All bulbs will be supplied by Brent Council, with the seeding works carried out by Brent contractors. The aim is to encourage local resident involvement. Brent's Contracprovide will deliverv trucks, tools, and the main workforce for heavy works like tree planting and wildflower seeding. Brent will supply the necessary bulbs / plants for planting out by volunteers from o u r community.

This scheme should improve the overall appearance of Sudbury and encourage residents and local people to take a long term interest in its appearance. This should not be an onerous task, as once planted out, the once a year mowing of the wildflower areas will be carried out by the Brent contractors at the correct time of the year. It would be highly beneficial if residents could take an interest in these improved areas and generally monitor their

tidiness and condition. This will be a good opportunity for Horticultural Society members to assist and give their professional guidance and advice to less experienced volunteers. We plan to organise occasional event days for residents and

local volunteers to participate in this programme.

Martin Page (Brent's Principal Landscape Architect) is responsible for organising the project. Sophie Seifalian, Keith Barker, and Cllr Keith Perrin are the local Sudbury Court area subcommittee for this programme.

Keith Barker will be collecting the names and contact details of people interested in

volunteering for this very worthwhile programme. Email addresses are preferred, to enable group notifications of event times to be publicised as they are organised. Registering as someone interested in volunteering doesn't necessarily mean you will be committing yourself to attend any or all of the events. It's just an expression of interest to be involved in the programme. Of course we would welcome as many volunteers as possible to make it an enjoyable, productive and successful experience for all. It will be your chance to put something back into the community and make the estates an even more pleasant place to live.

In addition, Brent have a Sudbury Tree Planting project with new Cherry trees along the Watford Road from Butlers Green in Sudbury Town up to the John Lyon Roundabout, and extending into Rugby & Eton Avenues.

Martin Page at Brent would like suggestions for other potential tree planting locations anywhere in the Sudbury area, these can be put forward through Keith Barker or Cllr Perrin. The John Lyon roundabout will also be considered for wildflower seeding at an appropriate time of the

year; spring or autumn. The programme of tree planting is planned to commence very soon to fit in with the season for planting.

The attached photographs act as an indication of the appearance and range of flower colours which could result from Wildflower seeding. The seed mix produces changing flowers and colours over an extended period during summer months.
