Burglaries: At time of writing, (08/08/18) the frequency of burglaries seemed to have died down a little, recently though there was an afternoon burglary (rare) at an address on The Fairway, the three masked white male intruders in their 20s fled in a black AUDI A3 with first two letters starting in FP**&&&, the likelihood is that this vehicle is on false plates.

If you are a retired person, or a dog walker out and about, or a resident out for a stroll and sitting on one of those benches on The Fairway – keep an eye out. Watch out for suspicious behaviour! As previously mentioned, most burglars are 'caught in the act' as a result of some eagle eyed resident or passerby.

If you see someone in the act of breaking into a house then ring 999, we may not be able to send a police vehicle straight away due to call volume but remember a CRIME IN THE HAPPENING is 999.

Telephone scams: A number of elderly residents have been receiving automated phone calls, claiming to be from the police, and that there has been a warrant issued by the Inland Revenue due to non-payment of tax and to ring a specific phone num-These are phishing (pronounced ber. "fishing") phone calls with the aim of getting someone to fall for the scam and to ring the phone number and get the resident to divulge their bank details. Be very cautious if you receive any phone calls purporting to be from the Police/Inland Revenue/HMRC. fall victim to the scare tactics used in these phone calls, do not be scared into ringing their phone number. The same elderly resident had three phone calls in one week, another phone call said that they were from their internet provider and that their internet was compromised. These phone calls are Fake, bogus and out to scam you! If in doubt, ring us first-0208 721 2969 or ring 101. Fraudsters can easily target the elderly:

they can use information published on the Electoral Roll to find out what age someone is and if they are listed in the telephone directory. Please consider coming off the published Electoral Roll and going ex-directory.

Cold callers: a persistent issue in this area. There are a number of retired people who live in the Northwick Park area, and they frequently get targeted by scam and conmerchants, both on the phone and in person. DO NOT BUY ANY GOODS OR SERVICES BY SOMEONE WHO RANDOMLY PHONES YOU OR CALLS AT YOUR DOOR!! I am astounded with otherwise sensible people giving "work" to cold callers—by doing so you are encouraging them to continue to target the area!

Remember 'cold callers' is the term given to someone you don't know who knocks at your house asking for work/or providing a service for a fee, e.g. driveway washing, gutter cleaning, laying driveways, roofing, tree work. Why on earth would you give someone you don't know, never met before, don't know their real name, where they live or anything else about them access to your property! It beggars belief, if they are on your driveway or doing your gutters do you not think that they will get to find out who lives at your address and the general layout of your address, don't be surprised if you get conned or burgled if you give someone who cold calls on you "work".

Bottom line do not, do not engage with cold callers.

The things that people get up to!: On the 25/7/18 PC Hobday arrested a homeless male, on the grounds of Northwick Park hospital, in possession of a number of hand sanitisers from the hospital—you know the big dispensers that are pinned to the wall. It is believed that they were drinking the hand sanitisers, which have a high alcohol content in them! Don't be tempted to have a swig if

ever you go to the hospital as the same male was subsequently admitted to the hospital with severe alcohol related problems. The hospital have had to remove the sanitisers from the main entrance areas due to such thefts; they are now placed in the wards.

Your old clothes: please be aware that there are organised criminal gangs going around London, and elsewhere, stealing clothes from recycling charity containersthe big ones that are on the street and in supermarket car parks. In early to mid-July, PC Kennedy responded to a 999 call to Sainsbury's Kenton: she came across a hapless pair who had used an electronic fob to access the Oxfam clothing recycling bins, they emptied them out into their van, but in the course of the theft had mislaid the van keys in amongst all the stolen clothing! The pair were arrested and the van seized; they were remanded in custody to attend court the following day. PC Kennedy has learnt that there are organised criminal gangs who go around in vans targeting the clothing recvcling bins, so please be on the look out. Normally, staff at the venue of where the clothing bins are situated know when and who is authorised to collect them, and if you think someone suspicious is emptying them please speak to staff before ringing police.

Moped crime: not a day goes by, anywhere in London, without some sort of mopedenabled crime. If you hear or see a moped or motorbike being driven recklessly, more often than not it is stolen and probably up to no good. Be very careful if you hear one coming up close to you, look about and see that they are not trying to eye you up as a potential target. A lot of mopeds are stolen, used for drug dealing and generally used for a number of crimes. A local resident has

seen some suspicious activity involving mopeds on The Fairway, so please be aware.

Also, please be wary about using your mobiles out in public and being completely distracted whilst using it as it is a regular occurrence that someone on a moped or bicycle can quickly race up and snatch your mobile from your hand.

If you own a moped, please be aware that they are quite easy to steal, so please do consider parking it in your garage or locking it to a ground anchor.

Thefts from cars: do not leave any valuables in your car whilst unattended, cars can be broken into very quickly and some people don't even notice car alarms going off. A resident recently left a whole pile of designer merchandise in the boot of the car and it was stolen whilst the car was parked up.

Catalytic converter thefts: It would appear that Honda Jazz vehicles are the vehicle of choice now, in relation to catalytic converter thefts. Please, if you own one do some research online as to how best to park your car and what measures you can take in order to limit the chances of this happening to your car.

Dog Issues: Over a number of years Pc Kennedy has investigated a number of dog incidents on the ward, these have been for neglect and dangerous dog incidents – some dogs unfortunately as a result of these investigations have been seized and destroyed. Owing to a number of human deaths as a result of dog bite incidents, the police are even stricter in applying the dog legislation to non-human bite incidents i.e dog on dog attacks, as the dog might pose a risk to humans. Potentially, your dog could be

considered to have committed an offence under the Dangerous Dogs Act if it is involved in an attack on another dog, there are certain aspects to these incidents that would be considered by police in the course of an investigation. So, particularly if you have a big powerful dog, please be responsible - if it is a soppy thing that will always roll over and never jump up on people then perhaps it is ok to walk him off the lead on the pavement or in the park. If your dog, big or small, has snapped or, worse still, bitten another dog, then you need to think about keeping it on the lead or taking evasive measures to direct it away from other dogs. You need to keep an eye on what your dog is doing and that you are in a position to react to it. If you have a dog that runs up to other dogs the whole time, then you can't be texting or oblivious to what it is doing, as certain dogs will not take kindly to other dogs running up to them and jumping on them. Thankfully, dog seizures in Northwick Park are rare enough but a few dog on dog incidents have been reported lately in the area of Pebworth Road and Stylecroft Gardens and so please be aware of your responsibilities as a dog owner. Also, it goes without saving you must pick up your dog's poop - I have absolutely zero tolerance of this.

Heating up again: apparently the hot snap is set to continue into October, or so I heard.

There are a number of issues with this. Burglars having easy access to houses when windows are left open – try to put window locks on your windows to allow them to only be opened a certain amount.

Also, some people have had fires in their gardens, barbecues etc. It is very foolish to set a barbecue in the ground in the hot weather. You have to be very careful with ground-level, non-enclosed barbecues as, if you are extremely negligent in the hot weather, a spark or ember could fall on bone dry grass and it could catch fire. And spread quickly.

Sun bathing nude: advisory don't sun bathe nude in public or in your back garden. A male was sighted doing so in a local park in the hot weather, doing this led to an arrest for indecency offence.

Councillor's Comments

I hope you all had a wonderful summer holiday and welcome back to all those

who went abroad. It was hot enough to sun bathe here and much cheaper too!!!. Even though most people were able to take a break, I can assure you that your ward Councillors continue to pick up and deal with issues that affect you all.

Ward Boundary Changes

The Local Government Boundary Commission (LGBC) has selected Brent to review the size of the wards within their boundaries. This is called an electoral review. Electoral reviews look at whether the boundaries of wards or divisions within a local authority need to be altered. The LGBC will conduct reviews either to ensure fairer representation at local government elections after any significant changes in the distribution of electors, or at the request of a local authority for other reasons.

The last review undertaken in Brent was in 1999. Brent Council meets the

Commission's criteria for electoral inequality with 7 wards having a variance outside 10% of the average voting population per ward total (8500). The outliers are Brondesbury Park at -16% and Tokyngton at 28%. Northwick Park is 13.44% in excess of the average total voting population (with 9820 total electorate).

The electoral review will have two distinct parts:

Council size – before LGBC re-draw ward boundaries, the Commission will come to a view on the total number of councillors to be elected to the council in future. The LGBC will come to a conclusion on council size after hearing the council's (and/or councillors') views during the preliminary phase. This could mean a reduction of Councillors at the next local elections

Ward boundaries – The LGBC will re-draw ward boundaries so that they meet the statutory criteria. You (the residents) will have an opportunity to put forward your ideas in the public consultation that will be carried out by the Commission.

The consultation with residents and the

Council started during August 2018 and is likely to be concluded early in the New Year. Whatever the outcome of the review, the changes will come into place in time for the 2022 local elections

Private Rented Sector Champions

The Private Rented Sector (PRS) community champions project was launched on 27 June at the Civic Centre, and had a good turn-out of nearly 50 people. The attendees were keen to take on the role of community champion in order to support tenants and landlords in their communities.

We are encouraging more people to come forward to volunteer as PRS community champions. Members are being invited to spread the word about the project by sharing the weblink and email address among residents in the ward so that they can become PRS champions, if they wish to.

We now have approaching 8000 properties licensed, including about 1000 larger type HMOs across the Council boundary. If you

think a property is an HMO in your road, please visit our website www.brent.gov.uk/prslicensing where we have provided links to our licence property register. There is also guidance on making applications to register an HMO, how to report problems, how we enforce HMO's and also to see our answers to a range of frequently asked questions (FAQs).

Residents Attitude Survey 2018

Every four to five years, Brent Council surveys its residents to obtain their views to inform the borough's future plans and strategies. In May 2018 Brent commissioned BMG research to interview 2100 residents (100 in each ward) and the results have just been completed. I can only provide a snap shot of some of the results as the report is quite large.

The initial results for the Borough suggest that 76% of Brent Residents are satisfied with the way that the Council runs things. Residents are less satisfied with their area than they were in 2014. The report suggests that 11% were dissatisfied with the way the Council runs its services and 13% were neither satisfied nor dissatisfied.

The dissatisfaction may be due in part to the major budget cuts and the reduction in the delivery of some services.

This trend is reflected nationally. Some interesting points to note were:

People aged between 16-34 were more



People who had resided in the local area (across the age grouping) for less than one year were also positive about their local area. People who tended to be less satisfied with the local area were within the 55 to 64 age group and had lived in the area for over four years.

Looking at the results from a ward perspective:

72% of Northwick Park Residents are satisfied with the Council

7% of Northwick Park Residents are dissatisfied with the Council

21% are neither satisfied nor dissatisfied with the Council

Health on your travels—part VI

I hope that you have had a great summer. This is my last article on travel vaccination, and it is all about rabies! In the UK we do not have a problem with rabies but, in many parts of the world, any animal may well be rabid. If you are bitten by a monkey or stray dog whilst abroad, you must consider that you are at risk of rabies. Rabies is a serious brain infection (encephalitis) which is always fatal. The rabies virus moves in from the bite area up into the central nervous system over a week to ten days and causes fatal encephalitis.

In April I was fortunate enough to travel to Sri Lanka with a school cricket tour and I was really keen that all the boys should be vaccinated against rabies. Rabies vaccination is a course of three injections which confers lifelong immunity. If you have been vaccinated against rabies but are unfortunate enough to be bitten, you will simply require a further rabies vaccination to boost your levels of protection but if you have never had a rabies vaccine, you will need intensive treatment which includes provision of human

immunoglobulin within 24 hours, as well as a course of rabies injections, and a speedy return to the UK. Unfortunately, availability of human immunoglobulin is limited and may not be available in remote areas. The last person to die in the UK from rabies was bitten by a puppy on a beach in the Dominican Republic. If someone gets an animal bite, you must immediately wash the wound for 15 minutes with soap and water. This should be followed by an application either of iodine or alcohol. You must seek medical advice. If you have youngsters who are planning to backpack in their year off, please ensure they have had a course of three rabies vaccinations and that they carry documentation demonstrating that they have been vaccinated. Otherwise their trip may be ruined if they get an animal bite and need intensive rabies treatment. The injections are well tolerated, I know as I have had them myself, and are highly recommended if you want a stressfree trip.

NOISE

The most common issue that causes tension between neighbours seems to be noise; and the statistics are quite startling—more than a third of UK homeowners say that their lives are made more stressful by noise nuisance.

During the summer months, when windows are open, the impact of noise can be felt more keenly than when the climate encourages us to 'batten down the hatches'. The noise associated with building works, in particular, with a lot of properties having extension works, can be very disruptive to neighbours, as they tend to go on for a long time. But also, entertaining al fresco, children playing in gardens and dogs barking, can be the cause of disruption to people's peace and quiet at home.

Obviously, with 'a little understanding,' we can all live happily as part of a community. Here are some guidelines, which I hope all residents can agree to (and if anyone would like to suggest any others, please do get in touch):

- * To show mutual consideration and respect for neighbours;
- * To discuss with neighbours in advance if any activity is likely to cause a nuisance or disturbance to them such as DIY, celebrations etc.;
- * To be amenable to polite requests;
- * To take responsibility for your household's behaviour, including children and dogs;
- * To be tolerant of children playing reasonably;
- * To attempt personal resolution of any issues rising before reporting them;
- * To think of others by keeping communal areas clean and clear
- * To make sure that all your household waste is discarded in the appropriate manner;
- * To take responsibility to report any problems/issues to the SCRA/Council/appropriate authority.

Building works

If you are intending to have any building works please ensure to inform all your neighbours who may be affected by noise. Give them advance warning and inform them of the duration and type of works that you intend to have carried out.

Monday to Friday, 5pm until 2am and Saturday/Sunday, 6pm until 2am. If you have an emergency matter to report, please call **020 8937 1234** and press option **3** for emergencies.

If you are a member of the SCRA (paid your subscription) you could also report to us, if you didn't want to make an official complaint to the Council in the first instance.

Of course, reporting a nuisance won't be necessary if all residents take note of the suggested guidelines and permitted hours of work. Getting to know each other helps (I think I may have mentioned that before!).

I am sure that you have all noticed the white butterflies fluttering around the gardens during this recent hot summer weather. Not just the occasional sighting, but several, together, many times during the day.

"You can't write about butterflies," my wife said, "You are the birdman! What do you know about butterflies anyway?"

I must confess that I don't know very much. What we have been seeing are. I

think, called **Large White** butterflies. In common with all other butterflies, they fly much faster than they used to do when we were young! I can't keep up with them now as they flutter along, five or six feet ahead of my best efforts to get close enough for positive identification!

My wife and I used to call them **Cabbage White** butterflies.

She recalls that one of her jobs on the allotment in the war-time years, was to pick the green caterpillars off the cabbages and other green vegetables growing there. A job she hated, and from which she often played truant! She would climb into a nearby tree and enjoy a good read instead!

My own recollection is of taking turns, with a pal of mine, manning a stirruppump and pumping furiously, whilst the other would do the squirting at all the passing butterflies! Good clean fun, but with a minimal success rate!

There are normally two generations of the Large White butterfly in a year, but in summers such as we have had this year, there could be three. A generation consists of Eggs/Larvae/Pupa/Butterfly. It is

a total mystery to me how the pupa changes itself from a caterpillar into a butterfly. It is one of the great wonders of nature.

The Large White is our most common

butterfly, frequenting both town and country, but I am quoting from my butterfly book of 1948. With man's destruction of so much wildlife in the last fifty years, I wonder what the situation is today? Can anyone fill us in with some up to date infor-

mation?

Swifts return

Several of our regular competitors did not see any of the returning **swifts** which arrived back in our skies at the beginning of May, but did see quite a few arriving a month later. This was much later than usual.

One correspondent emailed to ask whether they would have time to raise a clutch of chicks successfully in the consequently shorter time they would have before they had to leave and return to Africa

I wasn't sure, but in view of the incredibly long hot summer we have had this year, I am beginning to think that the swifts knew all along that there was no rush to get here early to breed. Those who arrived early would have had a difficult and cold start, looking for food. Those arriving later in such good breeding weather would have found plentiful supplies. I think the later arrivals knew best when to come.

Perhaps we should take more notice of them in our future weather forecasting!

Byron Court Consultation

Residents in the Byron Court corner of the estate had two consultations in July - one was on proposed Highways changes in the area, to attempt to cope with the traffic issues around the school, and in preparation for the 'new' school opening at the end of the year. The second was a so-called 'minor amendment' to the planning application of the expansion, to include a 3G pitch.

We called a very last-minute residents' meeting, inviting Brent Highways and Infrastructure officers to attend, in order to answer concerns of affected residents. More than 70 residents attended, as the proposed changes stirred up some strong emotions.

Proposed Highways changes included:

- * No waiting/loading restriction extending outside properties on Norval road, from the junction with the Fairway all the way to Spencer Road from 8-9.30am and 2.30-5pm Mon-Fri. (no parking for residents);
- * Narrowing the entrance to Spencer Road by extending the pavement on both sides, and introducing large concrete cubes;

A permanent (24/7) one-way system for Spencer Road;

- * 'At any time' waiting restrictions on the turning circle on Abbots Drive;
- * 2 speed tables and school keep clear markings on Nathans Road near the new school entrance:
- * Waiting and loading restrictions Mon-Fri 8-9.30am and 2.30-5pm by the entrance to the Park:
- * 2m wide footpath from the entrance to the park up to a new pedestrian shelter by the pavilion car park.

Officers presented their thinking behind the proposed changes and residents asked questions and strongly objected to most of them.

By the time you read this, the decisions will have been made. At time of writing, I have been told that "there was a substantial response. The results are being analysed by the Council and all responses and comments received in relation to each of the proposals will be fully considered. Residents in the consultation area will be informed by letter of the outcome."

What I would say is that, although only 255 properties around the school were consulted, the impact of these changes, should they go ahead, will have an impact outside of this small area.

The second consultation may, in some respects, be even more controversial—the 3G pitch. In a statement issued by council officer Jas Yembra (Capital Projects Team), the application for the 3G is described as a 'minor amendment' to the original planning application.

There are many reasons why this is more than a 'minor' amendment:

Environmental issues: removal of grassed area means loss of habitat. The original planning application pointed to keeping the grassed area for this very reason. The loss of the grassed area means less insects and worms, etc, which has a knock-on effect to wildlife feeding, so loss of birds, bats, hedgehogs, etc. And the 3G surface needs to be regularly treated with chemicals to safeguard the health of users, but what is the effect on wildlife?

We have already lost mature trees, which offer some protection against air pollution, as a result of the expansion, and this proposal means losing the grassed areas. How does this all fit in with Brent's policies on the Environment and Climate Change?

The School grounds are within a Flood Zone—how much consideration has this been given?

The increase in traffic to the area for people attending events as part of their proposed Community Action Plan, which points to a minimum of 15 hours usage outside of school hours, is not only detrimental to the air quality, but it will mean extra disruption in terms of noise, traffic and parking on our streets—and not just for neighbours of the school—the impact will be felt in other parts of the estate.

We will obviously update in next month's issue on the outcome of both of these consultations.

The only positive thing to come out of it so far has been neighbours coming together and talking to each other.

Seniors Outing



On August 1st, like many of the days before and since, we were greeted by a near cloudless sky. Around and about the estate 48 sets of creaking bones were preparing to set off on the Senior Citizens Outing.

At approximately 9.15 the coach, provided by Bessway Travel, left the third and final departure point, The Green, and headed in the general direction of Hastings. Hampered as expected by the M25, progress was fairly slow and many were looking forward to the so called "comfort stop" at Clacket Lane Services. This also turned out to be a shopping opportunity for some, which could not be passed up! In all, this stop added at least 45 minutes to the journey time.

We arrived in Hastings at about 12.30, and the dropping off point was adjacent to the

pier which has been constructed on the site of the old pier (destroyed by storm and fire). Unlike the last outing to Hastings in 2009, the pier is now open to visitors and provided some early leg stretching and a breath of sea air.

At least two couples were met by former residents of Sudbury Court Estate who are now happily retired to the Sussex coast.

The visiting 48 dispersed, under instruction to be back and ready to leave at 5 pm.

Lunch was the main aim for the majority and several opted for the restaurant on the pier but one group of four ladies were disappointed to learn that their food had been served to the wrong table and consumed by others! This was after a lengthy delay and they were advised no further food could be served. However all monies were refunded and the ladies eventually lunched at the hotel opposite the pier.

All passengers accounted for, the return journey commenced on time and a raffle en route resulted in the distribution of several prizes. Everyone endorsed the thank-you to the driver and to Susan and David for the smooth organisation of a very enjoyable day.


