Northwick Park Safer Neighbourhood Team

He comes from a background working on Safer Neighbourhoods and in due course will be out and about introducing himself; he will be glad to meet you in person at the next Ward Panel meeting.

R.I.P Jack Gilbert:

Ward Team Officer, Charlie, would like to give a personal mention regarding the passing of Jack Gilbert: "When I first started back in 2007 Jack and Jill Gilbert were one of the first residents to offer their full support and whenever I had meetings with Jill, Jack would always make me feel welcome and offer his support - for a rookie back then it meant a lot. I will miss Jack's stories and his positive attitude. I believe that the estate has lost one of it's great characters. R.I.P". The whole SNT echo Charlie's sentiments.

The role of SNTs and Reporting Crime:

The role of a Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT) is to identify local policing problems such as anti-social behavior (ASB), local criminality, and other Quality of Life issues. We work with partner agencies and local communities to identify and tackle these issues.

Unlike Police Response Teams, we are not always on duty. We have a shift cycle and generally are trying to do something to reduce community issues – through various initiatives or focused intelligence-led patrols. We can/do respond to calls (101/999) to police, but if a resident believes that a crime is being committed (assault, criminal damage, theft, burglary, robbery, fraud etc) then the resident should ring 999 if the suspect is still there committing the crime. If the crime is being committed by a neighbour and a person is being injured or they are damaging your property then depending on the

seriousness of this, then you should ring 999 which is the emergency number. If the crime has been committed and the suspect is no longer there ring 101, or report online via the Met Police Website www.met.police.uk

Please **do not** ring us (SNT) to report crime or Road Traffic Collisions - you need to follow the correct procedure. If you ring SNT to report you will be referred to the correct reporting method or your call could end up in our voicemail box for a number of days whilst officers are off duty or on other deployments. The SNT do monitor the various residents WhatsApp groups, however, likewise this **should not** be a method of reporting the crime to the police.

Where a resident has a boundary dispute with a neighbour, and they believe a criminal offence has taken place they should then report in the manner described above. They should seek advice from a solicitor in relation to issues of boundary or contested building works or to get a cessation of works, issues of the boundary are often outside criminal law and therefore not a police matter. Residents should not conduct any building works appropriate without the legal consent whether that be planning permission or agreement with your neighbours re boundary as it could end up with legal action being taken.

What has your team been up to?

Your officers, PCs KUBIK and KENNEDY, have had various other deployments in the past month which have abstracted us away from Northwick Park such as patrols in Windrush Road, NW10 in relation to the recent murder there, policing the area surrounding the Ace Café due to large vehicle gatherings there, racing on the residential roads and general ASB, we have also been staffing up

the local response team who were short of officers.

Mid-July we responded to a call on the SNT number - a local resident who witnessed a believed domestic disturbance on the street in the vicinity of the Pimple, we attended and investigated, the male and female were found and neither made any allegation, however the witness alleged that the male was shouting and swearing at the female on the street. A subsequent enquiry found that the male had given a false name to police, his correct details were found and he is now subject to an investigation in relation to this, and in relation to the offence of him driving a car whilst disqualified and a number of fraud offences.

In this instance, a call to 999 would have been more appropriate. But we were luckily in the vicinity and able to attend immediately.

We have been policing the Pimple and Northwick Park pavilion quite a bit due to ongoing complaints of gatherings of young people involved in drug taking – anti-social behavior (ASB). A number of persons suspected as contributing to this have been identified, contacted and in a few incidents processed for possession of cannabis.

Possession of cannabis is a criminal offence, it and it's users and dealers contribute to a vast amount of anti-social behaviour and criminality – see pg 6. 21/07/20 PCs KENNEDY and KUBIK were involved in a raid on Preston Road (Preston Ward Area) with the human trafficking unit in relation to an Organised Crime Network who set up cannabis factories. Persons at the address were arrested and the premises searched.

27/07/20 - We joined officers from Sudbury SNT to attend a suspicious address on Compton Ave. Entry to the address was forced to find a fully working "cannabis factory" with 400 cannabis plants inside, two Vietnamese males (suspected "gardeners") were arrested, the dangerous electrics disabled, a forensic examination took place. The two Vietnamese males were later interviewed, charged following CPS consultation and remanded. That day resulted in a number of officers involved doing a marathon shift, particularly PC Kouppari (Sudbury ward) and PC Kennedy, who ended up doing over a 24hr shift, and secured that a sample of the plants were sent to the lab on the 28th for analysis and vield. The set up of this "factory" and others involved is being investigated.

02/08/20 - PC Kennedy had an arrest for a Failed To Stop drink driver, who blew three times over the drink drive limit back at the police station. Later that night, en route back to the police station just after midnight, in Sudbury PC Kubik, who was with PC Kennedy, saw a male right up close to a shop front. This male was searched and a large

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implement akin to a crowbar found, he was arrested on suspicion of Going Equipped to Steal, and following interview he was released under investigation. Again this too was a super long shift for PC Kubik and PC Kennedy as both officers were due off at midnight on the 2nd.

Both PC Kubik and PC Kennedy have a number of criminal investigations on the go at the moment in addition to our other deployments, memos from CPS lawyers to do with various cases we have, amongst other things.

Cannabis and the Law: possession of cannabis, in public or private, is a criminal offence.

Cannabis is a Class B controlled drug, on a first time possession instance, a person will generally get a warning called a Community Resolution. However a number of factors influence this being given to the person in possession: history of person, ASB in the area, and amount of cannabis. A Community Resolution is not a criminal record but will come up in an Enhanced DBS disclosure.

Cannabis has been listed as a controlled drug under the Misuse of Drugs Act 1971. As an illegal drug, its' dealing is entwined with criminality – most dealers are involved in other criminality and, from experience, most cannabis dealers will also source other drugs. The 14/15 year olds who I arrested for peddling cannabis and street robberies are now, some 10 years on, dealing cocaine and involved in County Lines (the distribution of drugs from London to other parts of the county), which frequently involve the use of vulnerable children and adults. Cannabis dealers will often carry weapons.

The Pimple and Northwick Park are reported

as areas where groups of youths have been congregating doing cannabis. Sometimes driving there, smoking cannabis and driving away – this is akin to drink driving and is illegal and dangerous.

Often residents report the associated ASB in relation to groups congregating doing cannabis – litter, drug driving, doing 'doughnuts' in cars, nitrous oxide metal canisters thrown on the ground. If you see someone sucking on a balloon nowadays this frequently indicates that they are consuming nitrous oxide, which they get from the small metal canister. Nitrous oxide consumption is often associated with other drug use.

Bottom line if you want to be successful in life, and not get a criminal record or have anything that will influence your career do not do cannabis. Any parent out there if you find your child is doing cannabis, stress to them that it will negatively affect their life and their future.

Cannabis factories:

Cannabis factory is the term given to a property that has been made into a green-house for the cultivation of cannabis. It is an illegal enterprise and is frequently connected with Organised Crime Networks who are involved in large scale distribution of cannabis and human trafficking.

Cannabis factories are also dangerous the large scale energy consumption required for the strong lighting and ventilation mean that the mains electricity is frequently hacked into and the meter by-passed. It is not unknown for them to catch fire due to overloading the electricity.

Some tell-tale signs:

 windows constantly covered and apparently in darkness. Visitors, particularly during hours of darkness.



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- Sickly smell of cannabis constantly coming from a property. Many are discovered by passers-by who catch a whiff of cannabis smell as well as some of the other signs
- you might notice a high level of condensation at the windows.
- The buzz of a ventilation system on an apparently unoccupied property. The ventilation is to regulate heat, condensation, smell.

Robbery Personal: (i) near Northwick Park pavilion, victim was walking from Northwick Park LT station to The Fairway, 22 July 20 2330hrs, Victim has been attacked by Four white Males (18-22) on two Mopeds. He was punched to the face three times, and a Knife has been used to threaten him, his iPhone stolen and he was forced to disclose his PIN.

Burglary Residential (2): (i) Elms Lane (in 30s evens), 16/07 1400hrs – 2245hrs, front door forced and jewellery stolen; (ii) Kenton Road (in 120s odds), 24/07 2330 hrs – 25/07 0630hrs, three white males broke into a garage there and stole a bicycle;

Attempted burglary (1): (i) Dyson Court, Perrin Rd 10/07 1350 hrs – 1530hrs, window of house forced open, believed no entry gained;

Theft of Motor Vehicle (1): Sudbury Court Drive (in 120s odds side) 25/07 1600 hrs – 1729hrs 16 plate Merc stolen subsequently recovered

Theft from Motor Vehicle (3): (i) Rushout Avenue (in low evens) – 25/07 0430hrs catalytic converter stolen from 14 plate Toyota Prius; (ii) Holt Road (in low odds) 31/07 1850hrs, wheels stolen from 20 plate FORD transit van; (iii) Elms Lane (low odds) – 31/07 2330hrs, male rummaged through unlocked car -stole cash and documents from within.

My hunch is that we will be having one Sunday service of some kind, but that our online services will be continuing.


Church has changed forever.

Volunteering allows you to connect to your community and help make it a better place. Volunteering can benefit those around you as well as giving you a feeling of purpose. Dedicating your time as a volunteer helps you make new friends, expand your network, and boost your social skills.

I have found several benefits from volunteering including those above, whilst allowing me to support worthwhile causes, build up communities, and find passions which really interest me.

Ever since I was a child I have had a fond desire towards swimming. I started lessons from an early age and followed it on as I grew older. As my confidence with swimming increased, I realised that I could spread the joy and teach others how to swim too, and that was how I realised I wanted to share this skill. I started volunteering weekly at my local leisure centre. I would spend an hour per week teaching younger children different swimming strokes as well as encouraging them to build skills such as confidence in swimming. Seeing their progress, I felt a sense of satisfaction. Volunteering at the leisure centre was a great way to meet new people through a shared interest, in this case swimming.

September Tradition—Michaelmas Day

29th September—was once one of the most important days of the Christian year.

Widely popular in the Middle Ages, and because it falls near the equinox, this holy day is associated with the beginning of Autumn and the shortening of days.

It was also one of the English, Welsh, and Irish quarter days, when accounts had to be settled.

Tradition has it that Michaelmas day is the last day that blackberries can be picked. It is said that when St Michael expelled Lucifer, the devil, from heaven, he fell from the skies and landed in a prickly blackberry bush.

Lucifer cursed the fruit, scorched them with his fiery breath, stamped, spat and urinated on them, so that they would be unfit for eating. As it is considered ill-advised to eat them after that day, a Michaelmas pie is made from the last blackberries of the season.



How many of you will have had a harvest of blackberries from around Northwick Park? You've a few weeks left to take advantage.

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Favourite bake: Eggless Sponge Cake

My personal favourite bake - great to have as a dessert, or with a cup of tea!

(And it's really easy!

- Jenica)

Ingredients:

64 grams yogurt

128 grams icing sugar

236ml oil

1 tsp vanilla extract

187 grams plain flour

1 tsp baking powder

1/2 tsp baking soda (bicarbonate) 96ml milk

Optional:

Chocolate pieces, Soft fruit, Nuts If you want to make a Chocolate cake you could also add cocoa powder.

Steps:

1. In a mixing bowl add the yoghurt and the icing sugar.

- 2. Proceed to mix this well until the sugar has dissolved into the yoghurt.
- 3. Add the oil along with the Vanilla extract.
- 4. Make sure that everything is mixed well (you will end up with a liquidy texture)
- 5. Sift in the flour, to avoid lumps.
- 6. Add the baking powder and baking soda (bicarb).
- 7. Mix really well and make sure it is evenly mixed.
- 8. Once that is done add milk and again make sure this is evenly mixed.
- 9. At this stage you can add any of the additional ingredients which you would like to add to the cake, i.e. chocolate pieces, soft fruit, nuts or cocoa powder.
- 10. Pour this mixture onto a baking tray, (18 cm/ 7 inches) lined with baking paper
- 11. Place into the oven at 180 c to bake for approximately 25 minutes or until the cake has risen and is a light golden colour.
- 12. Leave for a few minutes before turning the cake out of the tin to cool on a wire cooling tray.

By September the year has tipped over into early Autumn. As I write there has been little rain so the trees in our streets and gardens feel parched and begin to drop their leaves.

Shorter days bring less growing time and our plants respond by aiming to set seed. So this is a good time to collect seed of favourite plants for next year, keeping it dry in paper bags, welllabelled and stored in the shed or greenhouse, in a tin to keep away the mice.

We have been enjoying nature's bounty for some

time now, harvesting currants and gooseberries, plums and blackberries All these summer fruits and berries have given us delicious desserts as well as the chance to enjoy freshly-made jam. Apples and pears are ripening fast, attracting flocks of starlings to feast on the fruit at the top of the trees. This harvest should rightly have been celebrated at our Autumn Show but we are not alone in having to cancel this year's event. The Middlesex County Horticultural and Allotment Societies Show, scheduled for 20th September has also been cancelled this year. The County Show, held at the Perivale Community Centre in Horsenden Lane, usually attracts entries from all over the county, reminding us that much of London's food was once grown in Middlesex, its market gardens sending fresh produce daily to London, all in friendly competition to produce the best crop.

With September, we are into the spider season again. Where do they go all the Summer? Early Autumn sees webs spanning

every likely flight path of a flying insect. I watched through the glass, one that had made its web across a window. A small bird feather, caught up in the wind, blew into the

web. The spider dashed out to inspect the new arrival. Deciding that it was not good to eat, wrapped feather in a few turns of web and cut it loose to fall to the ground. leaving its own web intact While one wonders at the spider's skill it gives no pleasure to see bees caught in a spider's airy trap.

Life has slowed down with lockdown,

giving us time to notice the comings and goings of birds and insects. This has been a wonderful year for butterflies. Countless writers in the gardening pages of the newspapers mention the importance of growing flowers in our gardens that provide nectar for the bees. They find all the daisy-like flowers with open stamens very attractive and delve happily into the bell-like flowers of agapanthus.

September is a good time to think ahead, to review the successes and disappointments of this gardening year and to prepare for any desirable changes to the structure of the garden. (I would like to move a water butt from the patio to a spot where it catches rainwater from the greenhouse roof). Time too, to order bulbs to ensure a colourful Spring in 2021 when we hope that SCHS will be fully back in action in a newly re-furbished St Cuthbert's Church Hall.

We invited Roisin Reilly BSc (Hons), Medical Herbalist, to run an online workshop on herbs and weeds to treat summer-time health conditions such as hay fever, sunburn, insect bites and stings. Wild plants have a high medicinal and nutritional value as they contain chemicals with antimicrobial and antiseptic properties which help plants ward off pests and help us too.

Hay fever

Roisin recommended nettle soup and elderflower and chamomile teas.

Elderflower is a prophylactic or preventive remedy which means you take it before symptoms arise. Drink an infusion of elderflowers daily, starting in early spring and continuing throughout the hay fever season. Elderberries are good for their antiviral properties during cold and flu season. You can dry them or turn them into a syrup.

Nettles have a high amount of antihistamine within them that gently block the body's reaction to the allergens. The young stems are the most beneficial. You can make a fresh tea or soup or make your own tincture.



German chamomile has a high concentration of chamazulene essential oil which is an anti-histamine. The tea has a bittersweet taste which you may prefer over nettle. Bought tea bags are not as fresh, herbs should still look vibrant and smell fragrant to contain medicinal properties.

Sunburn

You must hydrate the body to enable the lymphatic system to work efficiently.

Cleavers - Infuse drinking water with cleavers, rose or chamomile. Put a handful of cleavers in to a bottle of water and into the fridge overnight and let it infuse. Rose hips contains 20% more vitamin C than oranges.

Aloe vera – If you have an aloe vera plant at home, put a leaf in to the fridge before you use its liquid gel to cool your skin.

Lavender oil - an oil you can apply directly on to the skin. A cool bath of lavender oil and bicarbonate of soda will help with itching and soothe the skin. Pick lavender when the bloom is just about to burst open.

Bites & stings

Plantain – Tear the fibrous leaf from the plant and break it up a bit to release the chemical. Make plantain oil – recipe found under Blogs in the News & Events section of our website.

Geranium is a natural insect repellent. Recipe found under Blogs on our website. Fill up in to a spray bottle and spray thoroughly on your clothes and body, if you know you are going to a place where you are likely to be bitten or stung.

Roisin recommended the book 'Root to Stem" by Alex Laird for further reading

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
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VIP visitors

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
