

Street Robbery:

On the afternoon of 9/10 we had a robbery of a school boy who was on his way home – he was threatened with "shanking" (being knifed) and two youths made off with his iPhone 11 which the boy was made to re-set to factory settings. The youths who robbed him were teenagers. Please speak to your children about safety en route home from school.

We had a spate of robberies pre-Covid lockdown of school children en route home from school. I have previously put safety advice in here re this; the Met Police website also has some safety advice.

We are focussing on Street Robbery on our patrols as well as other local and topical matters: crimes that have been occurring:

- Please bear in mind the current Covid restrictions that are in place in an effort to curb the infection rate, police are monitoring the compliance of residents and businesses.
- As a follow on from the above, please be aware that the scam and con artists are using the Covid pandemic as a means to con people out of money. If you are cold called by anyone that you don't know, specifically if they are asking you for money for whatever reason then alarm bells should ring and you should be thinking 'fraudster'!

As always, please be aware of cold callers (unsolicited contact from someone you don't know) in person (knocking on your door,) on your telephone, via the internet or through your letterbox.

Where money is mentioned in a cold call, do not do anything rash and make sure you do due diligence to scrutinise any contact of this nature.

- Recently a resident looked online for a tree surgeon, they found one and asked for them to attend their address. The tree surgeon did minimal work and then asked for money upfront to get equipment the resident gave them the money and he was never to be seen again.
- The burglary figures are on the up again, so please be vigilant and on the look out on behalf of yourself and your neighbours. Review your home security, and if you are going away then please speak to your neighbours. Also, keep an eye out in the area for any dodgy behaviour people ringing your doorbell to see if you are in, hanging around for no apparent reason.
- Please once again, ensure that if you have a newish car that you keep your key in a Faraday pouch to prevent the keyless theft of your car. If you don't use the pouch then the signal could be boosted (from outside your house) from your key to enable thieves to access and steal your car.
- Also, please ensure that you lock your car when it is unattended and leave it completely free from anything of value as we are aware that thieves are walking around at night time trying door handles of cars to see if they are open. When they find a car unlocked they rummage around to see what they can steal. We find that frequently that the thieves involved in this type of crime are Class A drug addicts, but not always. Remember to lock up.
- Amazon and other deliveries left on the doorstep or in communal hallways are being stolen—again, by people roving around looking for an opportunity to steal, I always recommend picking up your delivery from a

depot or pick-up location if you are not going to be in.

Crime Prevention Advice:

Burglary -

- Ensure that your perimeter fence/wall, your house doors and windows are fit for purpose. Boundary walls and fencing along with shrubbery is the first line of defence to an intruder and should be good enough to keep a potential burglar out. A lot of houses in the Sudbury Court Estate have a shared driveway with easy access to the rear, if at all please try to get this open access gated off most burglars gain access via the rear of a house.
- Please ensure that garden sheds are locked and that all garden implements are locked away as frequently these are used to break in to houses.
- Consider getting an alarm / alarm box fitted, CCTV cameras or dummy ones.
- Keep your car keys hidden and not on/in the cabinet near your front door.
- Make sure to secure your side gates when you go out and ensure that your garden fence or wall is durable and designed for purpose to keep out intruders!
- Consider installing an alarm system and a safe for your jewellery and valuables.

Vehicle Crime -

- do not keep valuables in your car; ideally leave your glove box open and do not leave any goods/property in the car.
- do not leave a sat nav holder on display and rub off all marks of sat navs from your windscreen.
- Be on the look out for tow away vehicles, these are being used to steal cars from people's driveways if you see someone load your neighbours vehicle onto a tow truck/a truck with a hoist and your neighbour is not present then you may be witnessing a theft of your neighbour's car so consider ringing the police try obtain the registration number of

the tow truck

Robbery -

- Stay alert! try be aware of your surroundings when you are out and about, this is especially important if you listening to an iPod or on a mobile phone.
- Stay clear! if you think you are being followed or that someone looks like their up to no good, then cross the road or go into a shop/address ring the police if necessary.

Bicycle Thefts -

- Ensure that you secure your bicycle with a substantial lock at all times and leave in a well lit place.
- obtain your frame number and register your bicycle on www.BikeRegister.com or www.immobilise.com this could assist police in recovering your bicycle if stolen.

COVID-19 Update

Cases in Brent have continued to rise. In the week to 6th October, the incidence rate in Brent was 75 per 100,000 population. Rates are rising in all age groups now but the highest rates are in those aged 16 to 29 years. At least part of the rise is due to the increased availability of testing. The majority of the cases are mild and we are not seeing a pressure on the NHS or care homes at present.

Just to remind you we have three key testing sites in Harlesden, Willesden and in Wembley. We also have a mobile site at Neasden and trying to get approval for another testing site in Kilburn. You need to make an appointment at each site for a test.

We are now seeing cases in students resident in Halls in Brent. The nature of the student accommodation, with shared kitchen, means that a number of students are needing to self isolate as someone in their 'household' has tested positive. The University and the accommodation providers are supporting both the students who have tested positive—who, fortunately, have only mild/no symptoms—as well as their contacts; they are monitoring their physical and psychological wellbeing.

In terms of a 'local lockdown', we anticipate a new national 3-tiered system of restrictions will be announced by Government shortly. Different regions are likely to be in different tiers depending on their levels of infection.

Report a social distancing breach

Although the vast majority of individuals and businesses are sticking to the Government's social distancing and facemask wearing rules, a minority continue to flout the guidance or are simply are becoming complacent. This puts everyone at risk.

Whilst the council does not have any specific powers or legal duty to enforce social distancing or the wearing of facemasks, the Regulatory Services, Neighbourhood Patrols and Community Safety teams have investigated hundreds of Coronavirus-related complaints over recent months and carried out over 1,000 spot checks to check compliance with the rules.

Our enforcement team are working with you to be their 'eyes and ears' as our High Streets begin to recover from lockdown. Most businesses that we inspect are trying to comply with the latest guidance. Please play your part and follow the controls that are in place to protect you. If you are aware of a business that is not operating to the relevant Covid-19 standards, please report this to your local Trading Standards service in one of three ways:

Letter to Editor

May I respond as a parent to Cllr Johnson's

suggestions concerning Byron Court School, which appeared in the October edition of the Courier? I would concede that there is an unholy scrum in Nathan's Road at around 840 every weekday morning. However, as the father of a four year old who lives the other side of the Watford Road, I would say it is impractical not to drive at least some of the way.

At the end of the day, when our daughter is more awake and we don't have to worry about time, I can park in the Fairway without inconveniencing anyone; I can walk to the school and she can walk back with me. In the morning, however, I believe I have no choice

but to park nearer and contribute to the scrum. If the nearby roads were closed the school would have to relax the high expectations it rightly has concerning punctuality, so I am not surprised that the school does not think it is in its interests.

What are the alternatives? Either only to apply the School Streets project to Spencer Road only, where older children, who can reasonably be expected to walk a greater distance, go in. Another possibility would be to create a one way system during pick up and drop off times from Carlton Avenue West to Nathan's Road to Norval Road. The most fractious moments are often caused by one car that wants to go the opposite way from the majority.

This can only be a positive thing as the uncertain times continue, daylight hours are getting shorter and crime figures are starting to edge up.

- Ask your neighbours who may have had similar work done.
- I would also ask, please, if you have had any works carried out by good local tradespeople; similarly, any local products or services—please let me know. Let's see if we can get them in The Courier so that other residents can get to know about them and we can stop rewarding Cold Callers and Cowboys.
- Many local small businesses have found 2020 extremely difficult—and may continue to have difficulties in the months and year to come, so please consider shopping local in the run up to Christmas and not just rely on the corporate giants who don't support your local community, or indeed pay their fair share of tax.

Paying it forward in this instance is all about - when you get a good service (win) and you pass on the possibility of someone else also getting a good service (win)—the company will still be in business for you when you next need them (win).

So, please, email me and let's help out our local community and support our local businesses.

We're delighted to announce that Northwick Park Community Garden group have achieved London in Bloom's Level 4 'Thriving' award from the 'It's Your Neighbourhood' judging category. We have progressed from Level 1 'Establishing' the garden to Level 4 in a year! This is a fantastic achievement for the group and testament to the tremendous effort and dedication of all our garden supporters and volunteers.

In keeping with government guidance, groups of six volunteers have been adding some lovely perennials and ground cover plants to the community garden. The tansy, rosemary, thyme, marjoram, Moroccan mint. German Camomile and lavender already smell divine even though they are still fairly small plants. Lovage, meadowsweet, primroses, St Johns wort, valerian, sorrel and soapwort will follow. See if you can spot the new plants in the community garden next time you take a walk in the park. 

CELEBRATING TITUS BARHAM


For our annual celebrations in July we commissioned a new painting of Titus Barham.

He is the man who gifted his home and gardens for the enjoyment of local people and that is why we now have Barham Park to enjoy.

Titus was born with a disability which impacted his stature. He lived in the large house built by the Copland family, he created a rose garden next to his home and opened his gardens to the public for a 'Rose Sunday' every year. The Wembley News from 1936 reported that 7,000 people attended Rose Sunday that year.

The Bear in the picture represents part of the family crest. The name Barham originates from the word 'Behr' which itself is the historic word for bear.

The 120 x 70cm painting was launched over the weekend of 3rd October when around 60 people visited our Art event in the library.
