Northwick Park Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT)

As we're (hopefully) moving in to better weather, especially warmer temperatures, again I would recommend some general crime prevention advice on leaving windows, doors and garage doors open at any time of the day— even when you are at home. Please do not leave ground floor windows, doors, garage doors open unless you are awake and in the room.

Residents leaving their upstairs windows open for ventilation leave their house vulnerable to attack by burglar(s) who can climb up, get in through the open window while you are sleeping and burgle your house - ensure your windows have a lock on them so they can only be opened so much — that they cannot be opened so far that a small person can get in. Similarly, leaving garage doors open, whilst you are gardening perhaps, in the back of the house — an opportunist passing thief could quickly walk in and steal something. If you have an alarm, set it on a partial set even at night time when you are in the house.

Thieves can be quite brazen.

Current Work of SNT officers:

PCSO Charalambous continues to do his thing, patrolling, engaging with the public, dealing with various problems and providing support for victims of crime.

I am working on a number of criminal cases and was at Court for about 5 days in the past working month to do with criminal trials and also trying to obtain Criminal Behaviour Orders (CBOs are the new ASBOs) in relation to three individuals - 2 part of a group of young men who are Drug Dealing on East Lane and causing significant problems to local residents and shopkeepers (trespassing in blocks of flats, littering and smoking drugs and loitering outside local shops between Sudbury Ave and Harrowdene Road, intimidating shopkeepers and stealing from shops), the other CBO is in relation to the

male who is currently in prison in relation to criminal damage, assault of shop staff, theft and begging in Northwick Park Hospital.

Criminal Behaviour Orders (CBO) on individuals can be very useful tools in applying for exclusions to various areas and personal associations, so the person who has a CBO can be arrested for simply being in an area that they are excluded from and/or if they are with people they are prohibited from associating with. This is very beneficial in disrupting drugs gangs or persons who cause persistent problems/offending.

To apply for a CBO on an individual is very time consuming - you need to evidence their criminality and anti-social behaviour and their associations, then you need to go to court to try to obtain the CBO.

24th April, whilst en route to check on a report of suspicious activity, I saw one of the males from this drug dealing gang who was wanted for an Affray; backup was called and the male was arrested in an address off Harrowdene Rd.

On a number of occasions during the past month, I have been seconded to other roles, including processing people that have been arrested at football matches, in Central London one day for Extinction Rebellion, and also had to staff up a response team. Obviously, the response team officers are around 24-7 and when they get a chance they patrol and are obviously available responding to 999 calls and 101 calls.

Burglaries:

Figures are quite good at the moment, but business premises are still being targeted at night, so if you are going home late and see suspicious activity outside shops, or someone at the door of a shop when it's closed. please observe if safe to do so and consider ringing the police if you see any suspicious activity.

Snatches/Robberies:

Ongoing advice: Please be aware of using your mobile phone out and about especially during rush hour near tube stations.

There have been theft snatches by suspects on bicycles who quickly ride up to their victim and snatch their phones from their hands. The suspects quickly cycle away, and generally the victim doesn't see them coming so the description of the suspects can be quite vague.

Parking Issues:

Parking is at a premium on the Sudbury Court and Pebworth Estates and elsewhere on the ward. There is no place or space for people to be abandoning vehicles. Legally, a motor vehicle on a road should be insured. taxed and have an MOT; permit where applicable. Particularly in the Sudbury Court Estate there has been an issue with cars being left for long periods of time. It has come to light that some businesses and car repair garages have been leaving them on the streets here. Abandoned vehicles will not be tolerated. Please let me know of any vehicles that you notice as being unmoved for long periods and we will see what we can do. Be aware—vehicle owners might also have their insurance policies voided if they do not inform their insurance companies where their vehicle is habitually parked i.e if your policy is at one address and the vehicle is kept for longs periods at another, this may be considered a reason to void the policy.

Parking in general, and driveway obstruction in particular, have been the subject of umpteen complaints to the SNT in relation to school related traffic, particularly in relation to Byron Court School but not exclusively. If someone has left their car unattended blocking your driveway and it is believed to be school related, please report it to the relevant school and also to the Parking Department of Brent Council. In addition, you may wish to contact your local councillors if it is causing a persistent problem.

Speeding, driving under the influence and unfit drivers:

In 2010 I was knocked down on duty whilst on a push bicycle, the driver fell asleep at the wheel at 1pm and veered across the road colliding into me at a relatively low speed of 20 mph. The impact was incredible. I sustained a compression injury on my knee and, even at a low speed, the result on my physical health was immense. The relatively low speed of the car was what probably saved me from very serious injury or death.

Speeding is a huge contributory factor in road traffic collisions which can lead to serious injury and death. The Sudbury Court Estate is a 20 mph zone; from observation most speeders are residents! Please reduce your speed, only drive at the speed limit when it is safe to do so.

When I got knocked down, it brought home to me what is like to have over a ton of metal hitting you, that a vehicle can be a lethal weapon.

In the past month, I attended court in relation to a man who I have caught twice behind the wheel of his car over the limit for alcohol and who has a previous conviction for Drink Driving. Unfortunately he was found Not Guilty in relation to various points of law that the Prosecution have to prove. So, I would urge residents to report motorists who drive under the influence of drink or drugs – if they routinely do this it is only a matter of time before they are involved in a crash.

Also in the last month, an elderly resident was involved in a damage only collision with an unattended car. Police have had previous concerns over this individual's competence to drive and so he has been reported to the DVLA so that his driving licence can be revoked. Driving a vehicle is a very serious activity, with serious implications on the safety of the public if someone lacks the ability to drive competently.

Dog Issues:

If you own a dog, please be aware that any person in charge of a dog dangerously out of control commits an offence – this could be where a dog attacks another dog or where it bites a person—it is open to interpretation in the circumstances. You could have your dog seized and be prosecuted for this offence; depending on the case your dog could be destroyed. Recently, there has been an incident in Northwick Park of a young man who

was bitten by a dog.

I recently read on the Nextdoor App. which can have some useful local stories on it. of a couple in NW London who tied their dog outside a shop whilst they popped in. Their dog was stolen. Fortunately, the frantic owners of the dog went door to door to neighbouring shops and, via CCTV, managed to trace their dog to an address and they managed to get their dog back from the thief. I am not aware of the specifics as to whether the man was arrested or not but, being a dog owner, I completely empathise with how devastated these dog owners must have been upon finding out their dog had been taken. In some instances, dogs are never re-united with their owners. Please bear this in mind.

As Summer is upon us, please remember that it can quickly rise to very high temperatures in a car so do not leave your dog in a car. In summer, consider what time you take your dog for a walk - early morning or late evening is the ideal time, particularly when the midday temperatures are high. Always, have enough water for your dog and give

them water regularly. I have recently invested in a dog cooling mat for my dog.

Finally, if you have a dog that is prone to running off when they are off the leash keep them secure at all times and if you are using a dog sitter please advise them of this necessity. I had an interesting morning recently where a loose Jack Russell escaped it's dog sitter and I tried to catch it as it ran full pelt across many roads. It eventually went into a local cemetery and, with the aid of a number of people, we managed to find it and re-unite it with it's owner who was rightly miffed with the dog sitter. This instance and the instance of the theft of the dog serves to highlight the importance of your dog being Microchipped—which is also a legal requirement now.

Detail and Serial numbers:

If you own expensive jewellery—photograph it; electronic devices—take a note of the make, model and serial numbers; bicycles—make, model and frame number.

Police can re-unite stolen items with their rightful owners in instances where they have been registered, or when the owners have a record of the descriptive detail.

Report to police or not bother?:

Every day, at least a 100 crimes occur / are reported to police in the Brent area. Police have to screen what they attend and what is investigated.

If CCTV is not clear with a clear facial image, it might not be of benefit to any limited investigation.

Forensics is a limited resource and so forensic officers are only deployed to a limited number of crimes.

Despite the resources I would urge residents to report that they have been a victim of crime as it alerts the local police (Safer Neighbourhood Team) to location of criminal activity. It may also influence future resourcing to the police and thus your local area.

The reporting methods:

999 for an emergency situation – immediate risk to personal safety or that of property, if a suspect for a crime is still there and likelihood that police could effect an arrest (not always possible due to call volume).

101 for a non-emergency situation where a crime has been committed but the suspect i no longer on scene or nearby

SCRA AGM 2022—Summary Report



Welcome:

The meeting began at 7.40pm. The Safer Neighbourhood Team sent their apologies for not being able to attend.

SCRA Summary:

A summary of SCRA activity over the past year was provided, as set out in the May 2022 edition of The Courier; this included items such as local proposed developments and licensing applications; Estate traffic and highway concerns, noise complaints etc.

Resident O&A:

Q: About traffic on Carlton Avenue West: ongoing traffic issues, not helped by expansion of Byron Court Primary School and will not be helped by the upcoming development at Northwick Park. Why should residents pay for CPZ when many of the issues are caused by developments etc that are Council approved but that residents objected to. Brent should do something about this eg traffic wardens at the school?

Q: School parking issues:

Parents loitering. Engines on. Cars can be ticketed and even towed away if parking enforcement is called. Roads & pavements are in poor condition. Speed cushions ineffective.

Q: School travel plan:

Need to pull school up on why they haven't stuck to their travel plan.

A: Traffic is a big problem. Traffic survey has given us data about speeding and traffic on the Estate. There is no easy or single solution to this. Funding is a problem. Committee

is working together with the Council to look at options and to try to effectively gauge what residents want. Need to work together with Byron Court School and nearby residents to ensure student safety and ease of parking and traffic issues

Q: about Mumbai Junction:

First proposed development was rejected. But will there be more applications? What assurances do residents have that we won't keep having to field and object to multiple planning applications at this site?

A: No guarantee. Residents will have to keep working together and, with the support of Councillors, keep fighting back to prevent over development or unsympathetic developments at this site.

Comment:

Request to keep residents informed about local issues via The Courier so that all residents (including those without computers / smart phones etc) can be aware.



New Ward Councillors:

Diana Collymore & Narinder Bajwa – were introduced. They mentioned that they would do their best to support residents, including working on damaged pavements, now that they have been given a voice on the Council. Need support of the residents to come forward and voice their concerns, respond to public consultations etc.

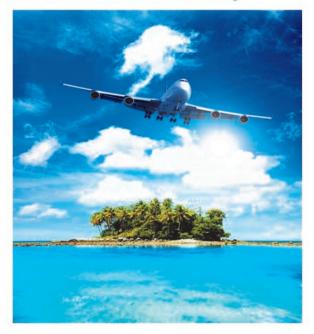

First Aid for Ingrown **Toenails**

Greetings, salgam, shalom namaste to you and all. I trust you're safe, well and in good spirits.

Ingrown toenails are one of the most common foot problems and fall into two categories.

A chronic ingrown toenail is when a misshapen nail is digging into the skin or when the skin is pushing into the nail due to tight footwear or misshapen toes. There is no break in skin, just discomfort.

An acute ingrown toenail is when the nail has penetrated the skin, causina a wound which then festers and becomes inflamed and, in some cases, infected.

First aid will depend on the cause and can include these steps:

- 1. Identify the footwear that is causing pressure and stop wearing them.
- 2. No break in skin aently insert cotton wool into the side to push the skin away.
- 3. Break in skin or infection use cotton wool soaked in iodine tincture.

If caught early these simple measures will settle the condition down before it worsens.

The best thing to do is to prevent and the following steps will reduce the risk of ingrown toenails:

- 1. Trim nails reaularly.
- 2. Do not cut them too short.
- 3. Do not allow them to over grow.
- 4. Cut nails, in the shape of the end of the toe.
- 5. Make sure you can see the corners of the nail
- 6. File any sharp corner and do not cut them down the side.
- 7. Wear comfortable and spacious footwear during active hours of the day.

How to Block Nuisance Calls



We've all had our personal time interrupted by nuisance calls. There are a number of technological solutions to limit these, here are a few:

From your home phone:

Most of the major landline phone providers offer a free service to reduce nuisance calls:

BT

'Call Protect' service automatically diverts calls that BT believe to be from nuisance callers to your 'junk' voicemail, you can also add your own numbers to block. You can then set up to send all calls from certain types of numbers (e.g. international, withheld numbers) straight to voicemail. Call Protect is free, and more effective than their previous services.

Sky

Sky Talk Shield is a personalised call screening service. It blocks calls from 'robots' and automated callers; 'live' callers are asked to identify themselves. When you then answer

the phone, you'll hear a recording of who it is and can choose whether to accept the call—add the caller to your Star or Block List or send them to voicemail. Callers on your Star List, such as friends/family, will then get straight through every time, while numbers you block will never bother you again.

TalkTalk

CallSafe works in a similar way to Sky's Talk Shield, asking callers to record their name so you can decide whether you want to talk to them. Calls from frequently dialled numbers or those on your approved list are automatically connected, while those on your blocked list or in CallSafe's database of unwanted calls are automatically blocked.

Virgin Media

Virgin has a much more limited anonymous caller-rejection feature, which only blocks calls from withheld numbers. And you have to pay £3 per month for this.

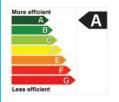

How to Block Nuisance Calls (cont'd from pg17)

From your home phone:

Many landline phones now come with some call blocking technology—some better than others. The cheapest call blocking phones often are very limited; the more expensive have settings similar to the main landline providers above. You'd need to do careful research

Using a standalone device:

If you don't want to replace your home phone and your provider can't block the nuisance calls, another option is to buy a separate call blocker and plug it in to phone. These usually work in the same way as the call blockers built into phones—they stop a 'black list' of numbers or number types. But the TrueCall call blockers are a little different, using the same technology licensed to some BT phones and embraced by Sky and TalkTalk, to screen out unwanted callers.

From your smartphone:

If you have an Android or iPhone handset you can add numbers to a blocked list, reject unknown callers altogether or set a 'do not disturb' mode that only allows calls from certain numbers.

iPhone

To block specific numbers, open the Phone app, then hit the Recents tab at the bottom. Click the i symbol next to the unwanted number, scroll down and tap Block this Caller, then confirm your decision. You won't be bothered with any calls, texts or FaceTime calls from that number. If you have iOS 13 or later, there is also a feature to stop unknown callers. Go to Settings > Phone, scroll down, then select Silence Unknown Callers. This blocks phone numbers that you've never been in contact with, don't have saved in your contacts list and haven't received their number another type of way, such as through emails. Calls from unknown numbers are silenced and sent to your voicemail, and appear in your Recent calls list. If you make an emergency call, this feature is automatically suspended so you can receive any calls for 24 hours. You can also set up a third party app from App Store to filter and detect spam calls—always be wary when downloading

third party apps, and don't agree to any terms and conditions that feel unusual. If you have found a spam blocking app that you want to use you need to go to Settings > Phone > Call Blocking & Identification. Turn the app on or off under Allow These Apps to Block Calls and Provide Caller ID. When you receive a call, your device compares the number with the list of numbers in the third-party app. Your phone will then show an identifying label chosen by the app, such as 'Spam' or 'Telemarketing'. If it's spam, the app may block the call automatically.

From an Android phone

Whether you answered the call or ignored it, all calls are registered in the *Recent* tab in *Phone*. Press the *Phone* icon, touch the *Clock* symbol to show your call history, then navigate to the number you want to block. Touching it will bring up a short menu, enabling you to choose to block it. Once you've blocked a number it will appear in your Blocked Numbers list, which you find by tapping the three dots at the top right of the phone screen and go to *Settings > Blocked Numbers*. You can also manually add a number you wish to block within the *Blocked* numbers page.

Call blocking apps

Smartphone owners are not limited to the pre-installed call blocking options available through their Android and iPhones: they can download third-party apps that offer far greater call blocking options. One such app is TrueCaller (no relation to the similarly named TrueCall). This has access to a huge directory of numbers, which is added to daily by the community of millions of app users, and helps to identify who's calling you when your phone rings. You can then decide whether to accept the call and can also use the app to build up your own block list.

One final word on apps. If you want to stop people from contacting you through apps such as WhatsApp and Messenger, then you'll need to block those in the app itself – blocking them in your phone won't usually be enough.

Here Comes the Sun...
