

Ward Boundary Changes

The ward boundary changed last year and, consequently, there are areas that used to be in Northwick Park ward area that no longer are.

Basically, Northwick Avenue, Rushout Avenue, Churchill Avenue and the section of Kenton Road from Kenton Tube station to Northwick Park roundabout is no longer in Northwick Park ward area but is now in Kenton ward and covered by their Safer Neighbourhood Team (SNT). Northwick Park SNT now covers the section of the Watford Road from the Shell to East Lane including Stylecroft Gardens. A map of Brent wards and constituencies is available on the Brent Council website and influences what policing team residents need to contact if any issues local to them arise, and also includes details of who their Brent Councillors are.

Crime Trends:

Car jackings

Although it hasn't happened in our area (Northwick Park Ward) there have been a number of car jackings throughout the Northwest area over the last few months – thieves threatening motorists with weapons and stealing their cars.

The cars stolen tend to be high end cars and stolen as the drivers have parked up.

Some have been robbed as drivers have parked up during the school run. Please be cautious as you park up, the males involved in this type of crime are late teens or early 20s; some motorists have been threatened with knives. Be on the lookout for suspicious behaviour as you get ready to leave your car; lookout for males loitering for no apparent reason. If you notice anyone hanging around, do not get out of your car, keep the engine running and ensure that your car central locking is on.

Having mentioned this, it is as a suggestion to be aware, it is not happening every day of the week and is quite rare.

Aggravated Residential Burglaries:

Similarly, this type of offence is quite rare but a spate of these offences have occurred recently in the Pinner area, although generally the figures are quite low.

Those involved tend to be white masked men who break into people's houses through the front door, threatening the occupiers with weapons for the family jewellery – the households targetted are mainly Asian, and the offences have occurred in the evening after 1700hrs, and generally in hours of darkness. Even though quite rare, it is good practice to set your house alarm on a partial set, in hours of darkness in particular, and also to double lock all doors to the outside.

Install good quality locks on your windows and doors, doors to the exterior should be locked with at least two locks. A London bar is also advisable as re-enforcement of the lock.

Speeding on the Sudbury Court Estate:

Police continue to receive complaints from residents in relation to speeding in the Sudbury Court Estate. By and large, the general culprits are residents themselves. If I receive a complaint of speeding I will look into it, make enquiries into the registered keepers of the vehicle, and make contact with them. Speeding kills.

Residents are reminded that the speed limit on the Sudbury Court Estate is 20m.p.h please adhere to it.

Burglary Residential:

(i) East Lane in 240 evens, 19/12 0930hrs rear conservatory door smashed open, unknown what exactly taken, suspects believed to have made off in a cream transit van; (ii) University of Westminster Halls of Residence 10/12 – 18/12 safe broken into in room, room accessed somehow.

Theft of Motor Vehicle:

(i) Peel Road near 80s evens — 04/01 2330hrs, Fiat Abarth stolen 2017 plate; (ii) Northwick Park Hospital — 09/01 1300hrs, owner has had his vehicle collected from hospital by mechanics believed found on internet, when he had tried to contact company following this, he couldn't; (iii) Oldborough Road — near 20s odds, 09/12 1430 — 1615hrs, 2016 Ford Tournea MPV stolen; (iv) East Court — in 40s evens, 23/12 2130hrs — 2220hrs, 2014 Toyota Avensis stolen subsequently found on East Lane by owner.

Theft from Motor Vehicle:

(i) Pebworth Road 20s evens, 07/12 0305hrs various items stolen from unlocked VW Coupe; (ii) Carlton Avenue West in 100s odds, steering wheel stolen from locked BMW 220D 2018 plated, no sign of damage to exterior of the car; (iii) Abbotts Drive in 60s odds, 31/12 0200hrs disabled badge stolen from car which was undamaged.

The reporting methods: 999 for an emergency situation – immediate risk to personal safety or that of property, if a suspect for a crime is still there and likelihood that police could effect an arrest (not always possible due to call volume). 101 for a non-emergency situation where a crime has been committed and the suspect no longer on scene or nearby, non-emergency incidents may also be reported online via the Met Police Website – www.met.police.uk

Cost of Living Crisis

This will be with us from some time, and with energy bills increasing a further 20% from April I would like to give you some suggestions to save energy:

Reduce Heat Loss—seal up gaps around doors and windows to keep the heat in.

Turn off lights—turn off lights when you leave a room.

Switch off Standby—turn off appliances at the plug when not in use.

Speed up your showers—swap baths for 4-minute showers.

Wash and dry smart—use your washing machine on a 30-degree cycle and aim for one less wash load a week. Avoid using the tumble dryer and air-dry clothes instead.

Be savvy in the kitchen—avoid overfilling the kettle. Fit an aerator onto your kitchen tap to reduce the amount of water used without affecting washing or rinsing.

Telecomms Installation, East Lane opposite Wembley High

Brent Council received an application: Prior approval for proposed telecommunications installation of 15.0m Phase 8 Monopole C/W wrapround cabinet at base and associated ancillary works on pavement of East Lane, Wembley, opposite Wembley High Technology College.

I have objected to the Application. Consultation ended on 20th January. I will update you further in due course.

East Lane: Off Street Controlled Parking (OSCP)

The next phase of the project to introduce off street-controlled parking (OSCP) has now been completed and we will be ready to start enforcement in the new year.

Part of the delay has been an issue regarding virtual resident permits which was promised as part of this process. Unfortunately, our supplier is changing systems and will not

be able to provide virtual permits until March 2023. What this means is that you will only be able to apply for paper permits for now, which will be posted to you, or you can collect in person from our permits team office if you wish. Visitor permits will be virtual and can be applied for through RingGo.

Applying for Resident Permits

(Where there are resident parking bays)

- The payments for these permits will be processed online via debit or credit card; there is also the option to pay for these permits by cash, cheque or postal order.
- Brent Parking line 020 8290 8300 followed by option 3 and 1 for the permits department
- · via email at Brent.Permits@serco.com
- Monday to Friday 9am to 5pm.
- Resident permit costs £50.00 per year, per vehicle – maximum 2 vehicles per household.
- These are paper permits and will have to be displayed on your vehicle once received.
- Blue badge holders are required to apply for resident permits to ensure our eligible residents are prioritised for the estates disabled parking bays.

Applying for Visitor Permits

- Visitor permit costs £1.65 for two hours; £3.30 for four hours
- Residents are allowed a maximum of 2 visitor bookings a day. Full terms and conditions available as above.

Parking enforcement for the new scheme was scheduled to be in place in January. Full details on the Brent website.

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SCRA Update—Pareet Shah, Chair

Hello everyone.

We don't have a committee meeting in January, but there are a few things to report.



1. Benches I'm pleased to report that the 3 worn-out benches along The Fairway have now been replaced. We had chased this up with the council several months ago and, despite local financial pressures, we are very grateful to Brent Council for replacing these. We understand that the previous benches were installed when the estate was originally built which, if true, means they were approximately 100 years old and have earnt a well-deserved retirement!



2. Serious crashes Unfortunately, over the Christmas period, there were several collisions in the area, resulting in an injury and severe damage to street furniture:

- East Lane (1st January) a driver collided with the Belisha Beacon in the pedestrian island of the zebra crossing outside Wembley High Technical College. This was repaired a few days afterwards.
- East Lane at the same location (2nd January) a moped rider was reportedly involved in a collision with a car driver. Emergency services attended, we are unsure as to the status of the moped rider



- Watford Road (2nd January) The crossing call button assembly and railings on the northbound carriageway near Carlton Avenue West were destroyed by what appears to be a crash with a car driver. The assembly had been repaired after a few days, but the railings were still strewn across the payement at time of writing.



Numerous residents contacted us with concerns about these incidents due to the dangers posed and the repair costs incurred, which are often borne by the taxpayer. We have contacted the council to look at solutions to prevent such crashes.

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
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Secret Santa's Christmas Lights Update

. . . And with Spring around the corner, this is the perfect time to review your planting schedule for the year ahead. Reflect on what worked well and what didn't quite go to plan. Look through seed catalogues and research any new plants that you might like to try. For the society, we had no Chrysanthemums last year and we will

be seeking out advice on growing this species in the hope that we can have new entries worthy of judging.

If you have spare time to work in the garden, Ivy and hedges can be cut back but don't leave it too long and be sure to check for any nesting birds. Disturbing nesting birds is illegal, so do be mindful of our fine feathered friends.

No garden? No problem. House plants are a great option to add foliage in your life. Not only do house plants look great they are also beneficial to boosting wellbeing and reducing stress. There are many good suppliers in the area and online. If you are buying fully grown plants they can be expensive but with a little care and time modestly priced smaller plants can be nurtured and grown.

For those of you with more ecological ambitions for 2023, you are not alone. According to RHS reports, planet-friendly gardening is

on the rise as gardeners look for new ways to save water, encourage wildlife and find sus-

tainable ways to improve soil. Peat free and seed free mulch is a good choice in this regard and can generally be located with a little research online. Apsley Farm is a good place to start.

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Northwick Park Community Garden

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One way to navigate the current economic climate and the cost of living is by supporting each other and growing crops as a community to make meals go further. Without

putting ourselves under pressure, let's grow what we grow best!

Essentially, if each of us grows two things, we grow collectively with the aim to share the produce with each other

Gardens, allotments, balconies or window sills are perfect places to grow fruit, veg or herbs at different seasons. Some people may have more time, energy and experience to grow food than others. It's about getting in touch with like-minded people and leveraging each other's skills.

The key objective is sharing with other people. There are websites where you can share surplus food such as Olio (https://olioex.com/). The community garden has a WhatsApp group – if there is anything you would like to share or swap, i.e. seeds, as we start this year's growing cycle, send us an email with

your mobile phone number and we'll add you to the group.

A few of our community gardening group are taking the Permaculture Design Course. Sessions, held at Byron Court Primary School. As part of the course, we are designing and planting up two green spaces/ sites for the school. One space has a few raised beds with capacity for additional plants. The other space is pretty much a blank canvas. As part of the design, we are looking at climate and weather patterns that

may influence these sites and soil conditions. We can then use the designs we produce for the school as a template to design individual green spaces.

According to Susannah Hall our wonderful course leader: "Soil is a medium comprised of soil particles, organic matter, water, air and living organisms, all of which are important to the overall health of the soil and the plants that grow in it."

Our homework over the festive season was to conduct a soil test. It was a great collaborative effort. Taj kindly hosted us at her house. We took samples of two places in the garden which Tai is designing as part of the course. Shaping the soil into a 'ribbon' triggered some giggles - look closely at the photo and the content of the tray and you'll why. One sample turned out to be clay loam and the other a silty clay loam, possibly as Taj had

the place of the latter.

We shall keep you updated on our designs and



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
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
