#### Dear Residents:

At the time of writing this article, I have just completed nearly a week of working down in central London to do with the Coronation. I was also staffing up the response team. I had no arrests down town and on the whole, between duties in The Mall, Trafalgar Square and in and around Leicester Square, what I experienced was fairly event-free and peaceful.

We have yet to get our new hats with the Metropolitan Police emblem changed from Queen Elizabeth II to King Charles III, I might see my retirement before this will happen!

#### **New temporary team Sergeant:**

Acting Sergeant Stephen Hicks is taking over as team sergeant on a temporary basis and until further notice, he will also be team supervisor for Preston and Sudbury teams. He is a very experienced officer and has come from a Safer Neighbourhood background, both as an officer and as a supervisor.

#### **Crime Trends:**

Both Northwick Park and Sudbury seem to be experiencing two crime types of note currently – namely scooters being stolen and cars being broken into for disability Blue Badges.

In relation to motorbikes or scooters, I would recommend always locking your bike, when unattended, to some permanent fixture such as a ground anchor when outside your home address or a street railing when parked up elsewhere. Better still, if you have a garage outside your home address please park it up indoors overnight.

Regarding protecting your car from it being

broken into for your Blue Badge, there are a variety of security protection devices to protect it from being stolen and, most likely, if a thief could see that your Blue Badge is protected by one of these then they would be less likely to try to break into your vehicle to steal it

#### **Burglaries:**

As Summer is nearly upon us, some advice pertaining to burglaries as the weather gets warmer.

Please be cautious about leaving windows and doors open even while you are in the house, or doing work on your gardens – an opportunist thief / burglar might see an open house or garage door, and quickly gain access while you're not looking.

At night in Summertime, residents leaving their windows open for ventilation leave their house vulnerable to attack by burglar(s) who can climb up, get in through the open window while you are sleeping and burgle your house - you are none the wiser until you wake up and see perhaps your car and jewellery gone! It can and does happen. I am not trying to scare you, but please take appropriate security measures - if you have an alarm, set it on a partial set even at night time when you are at home. Also, ensure your windows have a lock on them so they can only be opened so far - that they cannot be opened enough that a small thin person can squeeze in. Please bear this in mind as Summer approaches.

Please, please can you keep your porch locked even if you are inside the house, if someone gains entry to your porch a passerby might think that they are the lawful occupier or they might be somewhat hidden from view — think about it, they could be inside your porch tampering with your front

door without anyone seeing them. Keep your porch door locked!!

Not within the past month, but in previous months, the types of premises being burgled are houses or blocks of flats under construction or renovation—burglars are breaking in with a view to stealing fixtures and building tools—and business premises. With this in mind can you please pay attention to properties near you that are being renovated/ developed and local businesses as you pass by.

Visual indicators that are normally a sign that a house is unoccupied are, for example, – no car in the drive, house quiet and in darkness. If you are off on holidays please consider:

- lights and radio on timer switches
- ask a neighbour to park their car in your drive whilst you are away
- good locks on the windows and doors of your house
- good perimeter fencing it is your first line of defence.
- Consider getting an alarm fitted.
- Ring style doorbells as well.

Reformed burglars have been surveyed about their tactics—most are opportunistic and look for signs; asked if they saw two houses – one with a fitted burglar alarm and the other without, notwithstanding other features then they would target the one without.

The Met Police website has a host of information on crime prevention, in relation to burglary also, please check it out.

#### **Crime Prevention Advice:**

### **Burglary** -

- Ensure that your perimeter fence/wall, your house doors and windows are fit for purpose. Boundary walls and fencing along with shrubbery is the first line of defence to an intruder and should be good enough to keep a potential burglar out. A lot of houses in the Sudbury Court Estate have a shared driveway with easy access to the rear, if at all possible please try to get this open access gated offmost burglars gain access via the rear of a house.
- Please ensure that garden sheds are locked and that all garden implements are locked away as frequently these are used to break in to houses.
- Consider getting an alarm / alarm box fitted, CCTV cameras or dummy ones.
- Keep your car keys hidden and not on/in the cabinet near your front door.
- Make sure to secure your side gates when you go out and ensure that your garden fence or wall is durable and designed for purpose - to keep out intruders!
- Consider installing an alarm system and a safe for your jewellery and valuables.

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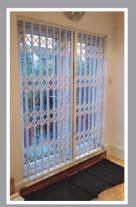

#### Vehicle Crime -

- do not keep valuables in your car; ideally leave your glove box open and do not leave any goods/property in the car.
- do not leave a sat nav holder on display and rub off all marks of sat navs from your windscreen.
- Be on the look out for tow away vehicles, these are being used to steal cars from people's driveways if you see someone load your neighbour's vehicle onto a tow truck/a truck with a hoist and your neighbour is not present then you may be witnessing a theft of your neighbour's car so consider ringing the police try obtain the registration number of the tow truck.

#### Robbery -

- Stay alert! try be aware of your surroundings when you are out and about, this is especially important if you listening to an iPod or on a mobile phone.
- Stay clear! if you think you are being followed or that someone looks like they're up to no good, then cross the road or go into a shop/address ring the police if necessary.

### Bicycle Thefts -

- Ensure that you secure your bicycle with a substantial lock at all times and leave in a well lit place.
- obtain your frame number and register your bicycle on www.BikeRegister.com or www.immobilise.com - this could assist police in recovering your bicycle if stolen.

The reporting methods: 999 for an emergency situation – immediate risk to personal safety or that of property, if a suspect for a crime is still there and likelihood that police could effect an arrest (not always possible due to call volume). 101 for a non-emergency situation where a crime has been committed and the suspect no longer on scene or nearby, non-emergency incidents may also be reported online via the Met Police Website – www.met.police.uk

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## SCRA Update - Pareet Shah, Chair

Hello evervone.

I hope you all enjoyed the bank holiday weekends in May, and managed to find time to relax with friends and family.

We had to reschedule our May meeting; it is now due to be held after the Courier print deadline. A summary of our meeting held in April is set out below'.

1—Unfortunately, we had to cancel the March meeting due to a power cut in some parts of the estate.

2—'Accounts – our Treasurer has had to step down due to family reasons, so this position is currently vacant. Paul Lorber very kindly agreed to look at the accounts and prepare a financial report for Committee review in advance of the AGM. The Committee is very grateful to him for stepping in at such short notice

3—Double Yellow Lines on the junction of Pasture and Stapenhill Roads. Residents had requested extension of the double yellow lines as visibility was very limited at this junction, being exacerbated by large, commercial vehicles being parked there. Following a consultation, the double yellow lines were extended in March. Feedback from residents

has been very positive and we are grateful to Brent Council for implementing this road safety measure.

4—Barham Park – we recently became aware that a new planning application has been submitted to redevelop the park keeper's cottages. This was initially withdrawn in 2021, and the committee is dismayed that this has been resubmitted, especially since restrictive covenants were in place to prevent such developments.

5—231 Watford Road (Mumbai Junction) – we do not have any further update on this at present

6—Security patrols – some residents contacted the committee to enquire about security patrols on the Sudbury Court Estate, similar to what residents have subscribed to on the Pebworth Estate. If any residents are keen to lead on this, please can they contact the committee.

7—There have been 2 further, serious road traffic collisions on East Lane and Watford Road this month (and it's only May 8<sup>th</sup> as I'm writing this!). We will keep up pressure on the council to reduce road danger in the area.

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#### Tate and Lion.

I was convinced that there was just a lion on the green tin of treacle made by Tate & Lyle. Recently though, I discovered that the picture on the tin is a picture of a dead lion with bees flying out of it along with the quote, "out of the strong came forth sweetness".

I was so surprised to discover this, because although I've seen this image since I was a child, I now realise I hadn't taken it in properly and had never really understood it. In my mind's eye it was a clear picture of a noble lion. I'm not the only one, and I know you will be going to your cupboard right now to check your tin of treacle, or golden syrup just as I did.

The picture comes from the story of Samson found in the book called Judges, which is in the Old Testament scriptures. In the story Samson kills a lion and, on returning to the

place where the lion has died, he finds that bees have made a hive inside the lion. Samson puts his hand inside the lion and takes some of the honey and eats it.

This book in the Old Testament tells of a horrendous time of evil and brutality in Israel's history. And it acts as a warning about how things can become if we forget about other people and God's call on us all to show justice and mercy. It contains this important quote: "In those days Israel had no king, and everyone did what was right in their own eyes".

But when our thinking is selfish, our words become selfish, which leads to harmful actions.

In contrast, Proverbs 16:24 says,

Kind words are like honey - sweet to the soul and healthy for the body."

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## 15-minute Neighbourhood - Pareet Shah



#### What is it?

The 15-minute neighbourhood, sometimes referred to as the 15-minute city is an urban planning concept that has gained increasing prominence in recent years.

It was first proposed in 2016 by Professor Carlos Moreno with the basic principle that everything urban residents would need for their daily needs would be within a 15-minute walk or cycle ride from their homes.

This would include things like education, shopping, entertainment, healthcare and even employment.

If residents needed to travel beyond their local vicinity, they would be able to do so, but this would reduce the need to regularly travel further afield.

#### Is it a new concept?

In many respects it is not a new idea, for example, many parts of Brent have had local amenities for decades, but walking and especially cycling to access these is often undesirable due to excess traffic and the perceived danger this presents.

Many of us remember 'corner shops' that were within walking distance, but many have closed due to competition from supermarkets that have encouraged driving.

### How can this combat climate change?

We are facing a climate crisis, with Brent declaring a climate emergency in July 2019. According to the United Nations Environment

Programme, cities account for 75% of carbon emissions, with transport being one of the largest contributors, in Brent transport accounts for 22% of all carbon emissions. Increasing walking and cycling, and less driving would significantly reduce carbon emissions. In Brent about a third of all trips are already made by walking and cycling and these could increase further.

Residents would still be able to drive if needed (eg blue-badge holders, or having the occasional car trip to collect bulky or heavy items), but walking and cycling would be prioritised for most local journeys.

## What are the other benefits and are they popular?

There are numerous other benefits such as improved road safety due to fewer cars, reduced pollution and noise, increased community bonds and overall quality of life.

It would ultimately make the neighbourhoods much more pleasant and attractive places to live.

There has been some recent fearmongering that these would result in 'Climate Lockdowns' where residents would be barred from leaving their area. This is total misinformation and a recent YouGov survey showed that having amenities like healthcare, schools and shops within a 15-minute walk are very popular. Cities like Paris and Barcelona have begun to implement city redesigns to match this concept, and this has proved successful.

## Volunteers' Week - June 1st—7th



Volunteers Week is celebrated between 1st and 7th June every year. It is a week in which the UK celebrates volunteers and says thank you to them for the contribution that they make. The week also raises awareness about the benefits of becoming a volunteer and the diverse volunteering roles that are available.

As well as helping others, Volunteering has been shown to have a positive impact on the lives of those who volunteer, assisting volunteers in gaining new skills and boosting self-esteem. There are many voluntary organisations in the UK that rely on volunteers to help others.

First established in 1984 by Volunteering

England, the event is now coordinated by NCVO (the National Council for Voluntary Organisations). During the week stories about volunteering are shared on social media and hundreds of celebrations and events take place.

Every Volunteers Week has a different theme which is designed to help organisations think about how they can successfully open up volunteering opportunities to all and increase diversity in their volunteer base and trustees.

## The theme for 2023 is Solutions To Plastic Pollution.

Some of the popular themes were "Global Warming" in 1989, with activities held in Brussels, in 2007 the theme was "Melting Ice – a Hot Topic?" and celebrations were hosted by London.
