The year is marching on and so here is some pertinent advice pertaining to the Autumn months – namely fireworks.

I am not a fan of fireworks at all, my dog was scared out of his wits of them, and the litter that is left behind when they are set off is another story. Personally, I think that they should only be in the hands of professionals. There are extra patrols by the police on the lead up to events that have association with an increased use of fireworks such as Halloween, Diwali, Guy Fawkes—so be aware. Here is the law in regard to them, taken from the Met Police website:

Everyone should be able to enjoy fireworks safely, whether at an organised display or in their back garden. Here you'll find out the law around using fireworks as well as how to stay safe, and report those using fireworks in a dangerous or threatening way.

Fireworks and the law

What time can fireworks be used?

Fireworks can be used in the UK any time from 7am to 11pm.

Exceptions are:

Bonfire night: 7am to midnight New Year's Eve, Diwali and Chinese New Year: 7am to 1am the following day

Categories of fireworks:

category one: 'Throwdown fireworks' including firecrackers, bangers and party poppers

categories two and three: 'Adult fireworks' available in shops

category four: Professional display fireworks available from specialist suppliers

Who can use fireworks?

According to The Fireworks Regulations 2004 and The Pyrotechnic Articles (Safety) Regulations 2015:

- anyone over 18 can buy, carry or use category one, two and three fireworks

- anyone over 16 can only buy, carry or use category one fireworks

- anyone over 12 can buy Christmas crackers

- only licensed professionals can buy, carry and use category 4 fireworks

- unless part of an organised event by licensed professionals, fireworks cannot be used on the street or in a public place

- it's an offence to throw or set off any firework (including sparklers and category 1 fireworks) in or into any highway, street, thoroughfare or public space

What is the impact of firework misuse?

Used irresponsibly, fireworks can cause damage to property and do significant harm to people and animals. Not only is there a danger from fireworks exploding, they can also pose a serious fire risk as well.

This is why members of the public may only use fireworks on private property, such as their back gardens, and only licensed professionals can use them in public places.

What you can do:

If a local retailer is selling 'Adult fireworks' to people under 18, please report it to your local **Trading Standards**.

If children are setting off fireworks in your area, our first advice is to ask them politely

to stop. It's possible they're unaware that they are breaking the law. If you know their parents, perhaps ask them to intervene.

Other Autumn Advice - Burglaries:

Burglaries tend to increase in the Autumn and Winter months, with residents being back at work and the daylight being reduced.

Burglary prevention tips:

• Ensure that your perimeter fence/wall, your house doors and windows are fit for purpose. Boundary walls and fencing along with shrubbery is the first line of defence to an intruder and should be good enough to keep a potential burglar out. A lot of houses in the Sudbury Court Estate have a shared driveway with easy access to the rear, if at all please try to get this open access gated off - most burglars gain access via the rear of a house.

• Please ensure that garden sheds are locked and that all garden implements are locked away as frequently these are used to break in to houses.

• Consider getting an alarm / alarm box fitted, CCTV cameras or dummy ones.

• Keep your car keys hidden and not on/in the cabinet near your front door.

• Make sure to secure your side gates when you go out and ensure that your garden fence or wall is durable and designed for purpose - to keep out intruders!

• Consider installing an alarm system and a safe for your jewellery and valuables.

High Value Theft of Car Scam:

I am aware of a couple of residents who

recently had their cars stolen in the night after having some respectable looking prospective buyers around during the daytime. The victims have had their high value cars for sale and have hosted some prospective buyers around to their address and shown them the car. In this interaction, it would appear that the 'prospective buyer' has swapped the car key for the vehicle up for sale to a duplicate looking key and they or their associates have returned during the night with the key and stolen the car.

What has your team been up to?

It's always hard to quantify exactly what you have been doing when it comes to writing this article as, in the SNT, we do a variety of roles and work tasks.

So in any case, PC Ryatt had guite a bit of leave in August and returned for our mandatory work days, which is the Carnival Weekend. I didn't work the Carnival this year but did some ASB patrols in Harlesden and had an arrest in relation to a male who I had seen the previous week in a car in the Chalkhill Estate - this male is suspected of persistently driving his car uninsured and without a licence. On the 28/08 when I saw him behind the wheel of the same car in Harlesden. he was processed for these offences and was subsequently arrested by me for assault when he threw a full can of soft drink at me His car was seized and he is currently under investigation for this assault.

19/09—I went to investigate reports of a drunk male on a doorstep in Oldborough Rd, this ended up being a lot more than this and subsequently ended up with the male getting arrested for assault and other offences.

I have also been processing a number of prisoners in the past month, notably a male who I circulated as wanted for a shoplifting in a local shop, this male is currently on bail and will be charged for this offence in due course. The male tested positive for presence of Cocaine and Opiates on his arrest.

PCSO Charalambous has attended a number of neighbour disputes in the preceding months and would like a mention re the importance for mutual respect between neighbours and the importance of neighbourly relations. Particularly, in relation to noise: keeping it at a respectable level, and also the importance of respecting and abiding by the terms of their freehold/ leasehold in relation to the boundary and shared driveway issues.

SCRA Committee— Update - Pareet Shah, Chair

What an unusual summer we've had. Much of August was wet, even a little chilly at times, and I'm writing this in the midst of a heatwave in the 2nd week of September!

We had our first meeting after a summer break, here's a summary:

1. Mumbai Junction redevelopment.

The council Planning Committee decision on this application was deferred in August. The next Planning Committee meeting has been postponed until October so hopefully a decision will be made then.

Keith Perrin has submitted additional planning comments on the website, which it is hoped will strengthen the case against this application. We would like to thank him and the other numerous residents who have worked tirelessly on this.

2. Sudbury Court Drive fatality.

Following the tragic incident earlier this year, we understand the council is looking at preventative measures—possibly by placing turning restrictions through the central reservation. A review has been recommended by the Metropolitan Police. We would consider this and may support such a proposal as we don't want to see another fatality here.

3. East Lane crash.



On the afternoon of 9th September, a car driver crashed into the pedestrian crossing immediately outside of Wembley High Technical College. We hope that no one was seriously injured and we have not received reports of any. The damage to the crossing furniture was quite significant, resulting in East Lane being closed for several hours. This not only inconvenienced anyone driving here, but also buses were diverted, causing much disruption.

This is the 3rd time this year that a driver has collided with this crossing and it is particularly alarming considering the close proximity to such a large school. I have asked our councillors and officers to investigate and look at solutions to mitigate the risk of future incidents.



4. Footpath along Watford Road.

I have been contacted by residents raising concerns about the overgrown hedges and brambles along the eastern side of this shared use path, primarily along the stretch bordering the golf course. This is causing an obstruction for pedestrians and cyclists alike, and the thorns are a risk of eye injury, especially to children.

This path has become busier recently due to the other side being closed due to the roadworks. This has been reported to the council using their online tool, FixMyStreet:

This is a very useful site, and I would encourage residents to use this method. If you don't have access to technology, please let our councillors know and they should be able to help.

I have also reported this to our councillors, and hope for a swift resolution.

Local authorities in England are spending £330m less a year on parks in real terms than they were a decade ago.

Our urban parks are the last vestiges of truly free public spaces, offering robust support for our mental as well as physical health, they offer us solace through solitude as well as joyful social space without an obligation to buy anything.

I've emailed Barry Gardiner MP and Dawn Butler MP to request a meeting. I'll also be meeting with the SCRA, other local groups and businesses to discuss my plans.



As the gardening season draws to a close, our gardens slowly take on a quieter, more subdued beauty. For many, this might seem like the end of the gardening calendar, but for the enthusiasts among us, October offers an excellent opportunity to prepare for both the winter and the promise of spring.



Now is the time for carefully pruning hedges, refreshing hanging baskets with autumn and winter friendly plants such as pansies; and tending to ponds and birdbaths. The final trim of the lawn signals a brief respite from regular mowing. Leaving fallen leaves provides a cosy shelter and vital protection for local wildlife, whilst seed heads left intact can be a wonderful source of nourishment for our fine feathered friends throughout the winter months.

October is also the perfect time to plant spring-flowering bulbs like crocuses, daffodils, and tulips, ensuring a breathtaking display in months to come. Tulips can be planted at least three times the depth of the bulb, pointed end up and around 5cm apart.

Herbaceous perennials can also find their new homes in well-prepared borders, while tall rose bushes can benefit from some careful pruning to shield them from potential winter damage and ready them for new growth in the spring. It's also an ideal time for the repositioning of trees and shrubs within the garden but do check if the new location is suitable.

Lastly, mark your calendars for the Sudbury Court Horticultural Society's Annual General Meeting (AGM) scheduled for Saturday. October 28th, at 15:00, to be held at St. Cuthbert's Church. If you wish to include any agenda items, kindly notify us by October 15th. We will distribute the agenda via email to members prior to the event. In addition to recapping the year's accomplishments and offering insights into next year's plans, we will be awarding society winners cups and distributing prize monies. Sudbury Court Horticultural Society is a not for profit organisation working to foster not only our gardens and gardening skills but also our sense of community. Our AGM is a convivial gathering, and we extend a warm invitation to all our members to join us.

Top tips for supporting people living with dementia

- 1. The first 3 important rules of dementia care are; don't argue, don't argue and yes you've guessed, don't argue - this is especially important at stressful times.
- 2. Maintain familiar routines where possible.
- 3. Give time to rest, be quiet and relax have designated quiet spaces with less stimulation available.
- 4. Ask visitors to stagger their arrivals large groups can be overwhelming and the person living with dementia may find it difficult to engage in conversation - one-to-one chats can be much better (especially if the person has hearing or sight loss too).
- 5. Keep it simple provide food and drink that is familiar and in small quantities lots of food can be visually overwhelming and off-putting.
- 6. Use music www.playlistforlife.org.uk has some great resources and you can involve the whole family in creating personal playlists.
- 7. Get outside and go for a walk there are wildlife spotter sheets available to download www.wildlifewatch.org.uk/activities.
- 8. Focus on the positives and what you can do together rather than what you can't (and don't make it a memory test e.g. "who am i?" or "can you remember who gave you that gift?").
- 9. Look after the carers check in with those loved ones who are carers, make sure they aren't running themselves ragged, make them a cup of tea, offer to sit with the person they look after while they take a break.
